NOTE.—Until the end of 1905-7 the whole balance of the Consolidated Revenue Fund was paid to the States. In 1907-8 the whole of the balance was paid to the States after the provision of £193,631 had been made for expenditure in subsequent years under Invalid and Old-age Pensions Trust Account. From 1908-9, and until the abolition of the bookkeeping provisions of the Constitution in 1910-11 the States received only three-fourths of the net Customs and Excise Revenue, and the balance of the Consolidated Revenue Fund was transferred to Invalid and Old-age Pensions, and Naval Defence (Construction of Fleet) Trust Accounts to provide for expenditure in subsequent years. From 1910-11 until the end of 1926-27 the States received twenty-five shillings per head of population per annum. The States Grants Act 1927 abolished the *per capita* payments as from 30th June, 1927, and provided lump sum grants for the year 1927-28, subject to the terms of any agreement made between the Commonwealth and all the States.

A "Financial Agreement" since made between the Commonwealth and the States, and validated by the Commonwealth Parliament under an amendment of the Constitution, provides, *inter alia*, for (a) an annual payment by the Commonwealth from 1st July, 1927, of £7,584,912 towards interest on State Debts, (b) annual sinking fund contributions by the Commonwealth from 1st July, 1927, at the rate of 2s. 6d. for each £100 of Net State Debts existing on 30th June, 1927, and 5s. for each £100 of New Debts created after that date, (c) the Commonwealth to take over State Debts existing on 1st July, 1928, and the States to provide all interest thereon in excess of the annual sum of £7,584,912 provided by the Commonwealth.

Since 1910-11 the balance of the Consolidated Revenue Fund has been appropriated for payment of Invalid and Old-age Pensions, War Pensions and other services for which Parliamentary appropriations were available, including reduction of the accumulated deficit.

NATIONAL DEBT SINKING FUND.

Table No. 61.—SUMMARY of Transactions in respect of STATES' DEBITS from the inception of Fund to 30th June, 1937.

In the years 1925-26 and 1926-27 contributions at the rate of 10s. per cent. per annum were paid into the National Debt Sinking Fund by the various States in respect of loans raised by the Commonwealth for the States.

As from the 1st July, 1927, contributions have been paid into the Sinking Fund under the provisions of the Financial Agreement Validation Act No. 4 of 1926.

Under the provisions of this Act the following contributions are to be paid into the Fund during each year:—

- For a period of 58 years commencing 1st July, 1927, on the net debt of each State existing at 30th June, 1927—
(a) 5s. per cent. by each State from revenue, provided that the 58 year period as regards New South Wales shall commence on 1st July, 1923.
(b) 2s. 6d. per cent. by the Commonwealth from revenue.
- For a period of 62 years on each loan raised after 1st July, 1927, provided the loan is not raised for redemption or conversion purposes, or to provide for funding a deficit for a State—
(a) 5s. per cent. by each State from revenue, provided that the 62 year period as regards New South Wales shall commence on 1st July, 1923.
(b) 5s. per cent. by the Commonwealth from revenue.
- Where it is agreed that a loan raised after 30th June, 1927, is to be redeemed in a shorter period than 62 years, the annual contribution payable by the State shall be increased to such an amount as will redeem the debt in the shorter period, allowing that the contribution shall be deemed to accumulate at the rate of 4½ per cent. per annum compounded.
- In respect of any loan raised after 30th June, 1927, to meet a revenue deficit accruing after that date, at least 4 per cent. per annum by the State, commencing from the date of issue of the loan, shall be provided for the redemption of that loan, allowing that the contribution shall be deemed to accumulate at the rate of 4½ per cent. per annum, compounded.
- Contributions of 4½ per cent. by each State on cancelled debts for the balance of the period during which the 5s. per cent. contribution is payable in respect of that debt.
- Additional contributions at the rate of 2½ per cent. per annum, for a period of eleven years from 1st July, 1926, have been paid into the Fund by the Commonwealth from revenue under the Federal Aid Roads Act No. 46 of 1926, 22 of 1931 and 69 of 1936.

Submitted herewith is a report by the Munitions Supply Board for the period 1st July, 1933, to 30th June, 1935.

Mr. A. E. Leighton, who left for England in January, 1933, to investigate, *inter alia*, the manufacture of a new cordite designed for Naval purposes, returned to Australia in January, 1934.

Mr. M. M. O'Loughlin, Assistant Manager of the Ordnance Factory, left for England in February, 1934, and returned in January, 1935. The purpose of the visit was to study the production methods of a new type of gun equipment which had been adopted for defence against attack by aircraft. Shell manufacture, armoured cars, and other details were also investigated.

It was mentioned in the preceding report that an Australian Principal Supply Officers' Committee had been set up within the Department of Defence to investigate the mobilization requirements of the Naval, Military and Air Services, and to survey the industrial potentialities of Australia. The Members of the Munitions Supply Board hold membership of the committee, and its work has been carried on in association with the Munitions Supply Branch, but the inquiries are reaching a stage that will necessitate the appointment of a full-time executive staff.

The Munitions Supply Board is responsible under the Minister for the administration of the Government factories established under the Defence Act; the control of contracts and purchases on behalf of the Department of Defence; the maintenance of research laboratories; and the inspection of stores and equipment for the Department.

The Contract Board is called upon occasionally to act for agencies external to the Department of Defence. Examples are the purchase of copper and zinc for the Government of India, blankets for the natives of the Mandated Territory of New Guinea, and electrical equipment for the Mandated Territory of Nauru.

MUNITIONS SUPPLY LABORATORIES.

Superintendent—MARCUS BELL, O.B.E., F.I.C., F.A.C.I., to 3rd June, 1934.
J. T. McCORMICK, M.Sc., A.A.C.I., from 26th July, 1934.

The Department of Defence suffered a pronounced loss by the death, on 3rd June, 1934, of Mr. Marcus Bell, Superintendent of Laboratories. Mr. Bell had been in ill-health for a protracted period, and had arranged for retirement, but he died a few days beforehand, to the deep regret of all who had been favoured by association with him. Formerly a chemist in the Explosives Department of the State of Victoria, he was transferred to the Commonwealth Service in 1908 at the special instance of his chief, Mr. C. Napier Hake, F.I.C., who had accepted the onerous task of establishing the Defence Laboratories. Mr. Hake only remained until the new activity had been firmly established, and on his retirement in 1911, to ensure continuity of effort, he stipulated that Mr. Bell should succeed him as Chemical Adviser to the Department. The organization thus firmly established afforded substantial assistance to the Commonwealth after the outbreak of war, and a variety of calls was made upon Mr. Bell's profound knowledge of the sciences as applied to technical warfare. He was a foundation member of the Federal Munitions Committee, organized to advise upon the utilization of commercial industry, and subsequently was appointed to be a Director of Munitions, with responsibilities connected with the import and control of commodities of war importance. In 1916 he was a member of a delegation which visited India in connexion with establishment of an arsenal in Australia, and in 1917 he proceeded to England on the same business, with the specific appointment as Superintendent of Laboratories. After his return to Australia he was principal assistant to the Controller-General of Munitions Supply, Mr. A. E. Leighton, in the design and staffing of the extended Munitions Supply Laboratories, and the wide range of usefulness that they have afforded, both to the fighting services and Commonwealth generally, and within the Munitions Supply Branch, has been due largely to Mr. Bell's advice and ability.

Mr. J. T. McCormick, M.Sc., A.A.C.I., Assistant Superintendent, was appointed Superintendent in July, 1934, and Mr. A. E. Dawkins, B.Sc., A.A.C.I., who was Senior Chemist in charge of the General Chemical Section of the laboratories, was appointed Assistant Superintendent.

In January, 1935, Mr. A. A. Robertson, B.Sc., A.A.C.I., Senior Metallurgist, resigned to take up the position of Lecturer-in-Charge of the Metallurgy Department of the Melbourne Technical College. He was succeeded by Mr. H. R. Williams, M.Sc., A.A.C.I., Metallurgist. In April, 1935, Mr. E. G. Thurlby, B.Sc., A.A.C.I., left for England to undertake a course of study and inquiry on metallurgical questions of defence interest, particularly in relation to gun manufacture.

The principal items of new equipment installed during the period under review comprise special baths for stability tests of guncotton and high explosives; a potentiometer temperature controller for standardization of pyrometric gear; and an electrically heated drying and glazing machine for photographic prints.

Owing to the nature of the soil in the laboratory grounds, there has been an unexpectedly rapid and severe corrosion in the underground metal pipes carrying water, gas and air services, and many have had to be replaced. Experience has shown that the condition can be rectified by treating the new pipes with bitumen and laying them in stone screenings.

A greatly increased number of draft specifications, originating from the British Standards Institution and the Standards Association of Australia, and covering a wide range of materials and products, has been received and examined. Comments and suggestions for amendment have been formulated where considered necessary.

Governmental institutions other than the Department of Defence and commercial firms have continued to take advantage of the facilities available for investigation of processes and materials. A measure of the increased demand upon the resources of the laboratories may be gauged by the increase of staff, mainly technical officers, from 37 on 30th June, 1933, to 57 on 30th June, 1935.

EXPLOSIVES AND AMMUNITION.

Climatic trials of a variety of cordites and explosives were continued, and the absence of corrosions or of abnormal deteriorations indicates that a high standard of stability is being maintained in manufacture.

In connexion with the preparations for production of Naval cordite, a highly specialized system of testing and proof is required, and a close study was made of available information regarding building, fittings, equipment and methods of testing, particularly in regard to high precision calorimetry. The erection of the specially insulated calorimetric laboratory building will be taken in hand shortly.

The control of manufacture of Naval cordite also entails nitrocotton analysis to a high degree of precision, and nitrometers have been ordered for the purpose.

Other matters referred for investigation or advice included a suspected oxidation of charges in aircraft bombs; deposits on the lead linings of gun-cotton vats; the nature and quantity of foreign matter collected on straining cloths during the pressing of cordite; the influence of rubber particles on the stability of cordite, and the suitability of materials for magazine floors.

TIMBER AND ENTOMOLOGY.

In the laboratory seasoning kilns, 94,770 super. feet of timber were seasoned during 1933-34 and 91,650 super. feet were similarly treated during 1934-35, the charges consisting of stock varying from boards of $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch thickness to $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches by $3\frac{3}{4}$ inches felloes for artillery wheels.

Advice has been given on such questions as the condition of timber in crashed aircraft; acidity of timber from acetate vats; effect of powellizing on strength of timber; treatment of wooden gratings for water channels; efficiency of rot-protectants; rapid methods for moisture determination; comparative properties of timbers for various uses, &c.

Tests have been made of plywoods, cements and glues for aircraft, during which an extensive survey of locally manufactured hide glues was conducted for determining a quality suitable for use in aircraft construction at the Ordnance Factory.

Storage trials have been continued on the resistance to borer of certain local and imported timbers; on the protection of ammunition boxes against pest attack; and on the efficacy of various preparations for moth-proofing woollen cloth and felt.

GENERAL CHEMISTRY.

On behalf of the Inspection Department, examination was made of a variety of samples representing trade and departmental factory products, examples of which are the use of "Phenyle" for cleaning aluminium alloy engine parts; how to secure adhesion of a rubber-asbestos lining to bullet-proof plate; efficacy of "Cuprinol" for the rot-proofing of canvas; conditions for use of trisodium phosphate in the treatment of boiler feed water; efficacy of cellulose coating in preventing change in dimensions of bristol board, as used in map printing, consequent upon variation of atmospheric humidity; the corrosion of steel piston rods in gun recoil mechanisms, the suitability of waterproofing solution for fabrics used for military purposes, the preparation of a graphite lubricant for tram trolley buses, and the development of a paint remover for use on aeroplane parts.

Technical questions relating to the supply and use of lubricants under the departmental co-ordinated scheme have continued to be handled, and arising out of the Controller-General's visit overseas, a useful exchange of information has taken place with the War Department Chemist on the matter.

An interesting innovation has been the construction of mercury vapour lamps, which involved the development of high temperature technique for the working of quartz.

METALLURGY.

Manufacturing problems associated with the Ordnance Factory included a method of production of chill cast iron practice shot to specified tensile properties; the welding of bullet-proof plates by various methods; evaluation of the "Parkerizing" process, and comparison with tinning and nickel-plating for the rust-proofing of steel articles (process subsequently adopted for certain components); aluminium alloys and methods of treatment for the production of chill cast pistons for aero engines; and material and methods of treatment employed in the production of large air bombs. Other problems related to dies for drawing and bottling operations on projectiles, streamline wires, copper driving bands, zinc-sprayed steel sheets for gun-cotton plant, control of gaseous atmospheres during heat-treatment, &c.

In connexion with the manufacture of copper driving bands for projectiles, defects were found to develop in certain of the bands during firing. These were traceable to faults in the original copper tubing, and a sorting test was developed whereby the defects could be detected and the tubing rejected before manufacture into bands.

Another important investigation, with successful results, concerned cotton treatment plant at the Explosives Factory. The plant was dismantled for replacement of rivets found to be cracked or weakened by "caustic" embrittlement, and the plates were found to be similarly affected. Based on laboratory tests, extensive reconditioning was recommended, which involved the heat treatment of plates, a chiselling away of cracks, the repair of plates by welding, and the welding of seams.

Investigations into failures of metallic components in working operation were again a prominent feature of the work, the majority of these being components of aircraft—both frames and engines—and of small arms.

A limited amount of work was carried out for semi-governmental and private concerns: the principal subjects of investigation were scaled and corroded boiler tubes, valves and grids for gas meters, traction gears of electric locomotives, linotype metal and spark plug electrodes, &c.

PHYSICS.

The new equipment included slip gauges, workshop end bars, roller gauges, and cylindrical squares for metrology; an optical bench for measuring elementary properties of optical units; and an apparatus, designed in the laboratory, for rapid and efficient cleaning of mercury.

A new feature in metrological work in the laboratory has been the systematic scrutiny, before manufacture is commenced, of designs of gauges for Naval stores. Drawings of gauges and checks are being closely intercompared with one another and with drawings of stores to be gauged, and where necessary amended designs are prepared, having regard to such factors as cost of production, reduction of wear, ease of application, and suitability for measurement under local conditions. The arrangement will assist current production and from the point of view of preparedness, facilitate a greatly increased out-turn of gauges with the minimum of delay. Out of a scrutiny of one set of 27 gauge drawings, it was possible to recommend amendments to twenty drawings.

The modification of military range finders to a new design has been continued, and 59 instruments were converted for the Military Service, and twenty for the New Zealand Government. This and other optical and instrument work has been facilitated by the construction of a special dust-free room for optical cleaning. Range-finders have also been adjusted on behalf of the Naval Service.

One thousand three hundred and twenty-one physical and mechanical tests on materials were carried out, and nine pressure gauges tested. A special check on the 50-ton testing machine proved it to be satisfactorily maintaining its accuracy.

Weighing machines, scales and weights were checked for the Service Boards.

A Goodbrand fabric testing machine taken over from the Military Service was overhauled, modified and converted from hand operation to motor drive.

CHEMICAL DEFENCE.

The assembly of respirators on behalf of the Naval, Military, and Air Services has been continued. Locally assembled respirators which had been on issue to ratings on sea-going ships for periods up to three years were examined and found in general to be in good condition.

Inquiries from governmental and private concerns have been continued regarding protective measures against gas and dust hazards, and respirators were supplied where it has been practicable for the conditions described.

Special inquiries that received attention related to the possibility of local manufacture of stabilized bleaching powder; as to Australian stocks of white phosphorus; the methods of determining carbon monoxide and nitrous fumes inside an armoured car; the production of smoke for sky writing; the use of smoke mixture in connexion with illuminations; and the possibility of using chloro-sulphonic smoke for the protection of vines against damage by frost.

INSPECTION.

Chief Inspector—LIEUTENANT-COLONEL H. B. L. GIPPS (RETD.).

The Inspection Branch is charged with the examination of all classes of munitions during manufacture.

It is the policy of the Department of Defence in Australia that as far as possible the standards and specifications of the British War Office shall be observed, thereby ensuring uniformity and interchangeability, and as there have been many changes in design, including such important details as developments in anti-aircraft gun equipment, the introduction of new types of shell fuzes, and changes in small arms ammunition and machine guns, the Chief Inspector, Lieutenant-Colonel H. B. L. Gipps, left Australia in January, 1935, to investigate the latest conditions in the United Kingdom in regard to Munitions Inspection.

During the absence of Lieutenant-Colonel Gipps, Major H. S. Nurse, Australian Staff Corps, was seconded from the Military Board for duty as Acting Chief Inspector. Major Nurse had held a previous appointment with the Munitions Supply Board as Armament Inspector.

A summary of the activities of the various sections of the branch, which considerably increased during the period under review, is contained in the following notes.

CENTRAL SECTION.

The Section has been associated with the Munitions Supply Laboratories in an endeavour to obtain special alloy castings from the trade, and some progress has been made, with promise of a more satisfactory condition for the future. A large quantity of bronze castings will ultimately be required for gun and carriage construction and preparations to that end are in hand.

The work of the metrological sub-section has been expanded considerably, due to service demands for gauges for the new types of armament, and in the aircraft sub-section work on the order for six Moth fuselages is well in hand.

EQUIPMENT SECTION.

With the increased demands for various types of munitions there has been a considerable expansion in the equipment section. Orders for the 3-in. anti-aircraft equipment, which involved the receipt, recording and issue of a very large number of drawings and other particulars, have particularly taxed the staff.

ARTILLERY PROOF RANGE.

Many different types of ammunition were tested, including several not previously made in this country. The results have been uniformly successful.

The erection of new buildings and additions is proceeding.

SMALL ARMS SECTION.

In addition to the customary work of inspection of the land pattern of Vickers machine gun, new and converted rifles and various small arms parts, the inspection and proof of the new air pattern Vickers machine gun was undertaken for the Air Board. The first batch passed firing test and were accepted for service in February, 1935. Trials were also carried out on behalf of the Air Board of another type of Vickers machine gun.

SMALL ARMS AMMUNITION SECTION.

The usual routine examination of ammunition has shown an increase, due to requests from the services for special examinations and proof of ammunition.

Point three hundred and three inch armour-piercing cartridges were successfully manufactured and proved for the first time, and another new feature was the inspection of belt links for use with the air pattern Vickers machine guns: also, investigations were carried out on wads for air service ammunition.

GUN AND CARRIAGE SECTION.

The main part of the work of this section was in connexion with the components of the 3-in. anti-aircraft equipment for the military authorities.

Other features of particular interest were in connexion with the experimental armoured car body, and the inspection of motor car bodies made at Maribyrnong for the military and air authorities.

Timber is playing an increasing part in the products of the Munitions Supply Board, and considerable investigational work has been undertaken to ascertain the most suitable types of Australian timber for particular purposes.

GUN AMMUNITION SECTION.

There has been a considerable increase in the quantity of gun ammunition passing through the section, and the inspection of artillery ammunition for the Government of New Zealand has been continued.

In the manufacture of munitions, a high quality of materials is required, and with the co-operation of the steel makers, investigations have been carried out at Newcastle and Port Kembla for production of steel free from defects which would be unimportant commercially.

STORES SECTION.

The work of the stores section has continued on the general lines of previous years, but the value of stores inspected showed an increase of approximately 60 per cent. The first contract for the new pattern army boot was completed and improvements in the construction have been incorporated in the specification. A contract for the supply of army greatcoats (the first since 1918) was let to a Brisbane firm.

As hitherto, assistance has been given freely to other Government Departments, both Federal and State. This included advice regarding tenderers' samples and quotations, as well as actual inspections.

MUNITIONS FACTORIES.

A revival of interest in Defence, coupled with a general improvement in the finances of the country whereby there has been increased allocations under the Departmental Votes, has been reflected in a marked development in the manufactures undertaken at the munitions factories. The Clothing Factory has continued in operation at full capacity.

The orders for manufactures, received during recent years by the munitions establishments in Victoria and New South Wales, other than the Clothing Factory, amount as follows:

AMMUNITION FACTORY.

Manager—J. H. WRIGLEY, B.E. (QLD.), A.M.I.E. (AUST.)

The manufacture and sales of commercial products have taken an important place in the operations of the Ammunition Factory. The demands for sheet and strip metals and for manufactured goods have continued to increase, and by building up stocks of metals in process, and of semi-manufactured goods, quicker delivery has been practicable. Since commercial production was undertaken, the sales have been as follows:—

In carrying on the manufacture of commercial products there has been keen competition from importers of overseas manufactures, and selling prices have had to be regulated accordingly. Current rates of exchange favour the local manufacturer, but on the other hand, the overseas manufacturer has the benefit of lower rates of wages and lower prices for basic metals. The general result has been that the local consumer has derived considerable benefit from the entry of the factory into the business, and the department has created employment for a number of men and provided a market for locally mined metals. It is with satisfaction, therefore, that advice has been received of the intention of an Australian company to instal the plant required for rolling brass sheet and strip.

Of manufactures for departmental purposes, there has been a considerable increase in the production of small arms ammunition, and the conditions for 1934-35 were more satisfactory, both from the economic and technical standpoint. The work of de-bulletting and blowing-off of unserviceable ammunition was continued.

In the gun ammunition section there has been an appreciable increase in the varieties and quantities of components for artillery ammunition and other armament stores. A large proportion of the work consisted of reconditioning fired brass cartridge cases, and many thousands were thus treated for further use. A substantial order on that account was received from the Government of New Zealand, and other items of munitions were also manufactured for the same destination.

A new toolroom building was completed in June, 1935, and arrangements are being made for equipment. For treatment of scrap metals within the factory, a reverberatory furnace and a tube mill for briquetting have been installed, thereby improving the selling qualities of the scrap metals.

The accidents to employees during 1933-34 necessitating absence from duty were 73, involving an expenditure of £766 12s. 3d., and for the year 1934-35 the figures were 63 and £650 6s. 6d. respectively.

EXPLOSIVES FACTORY.

Manager—A. A. TOPP, A.M.T.C., A.I.C., A.A.C.I.

The manufacturing operations have continued upon an increased scale, and in 1935 the production of trinitrotoluene reached a point higher than at any stage since the plant was brought into operation in 1928. The output of nitrobenzene, which is sold for commercial purposes as oil of mirbane, was also high, the figures being 158,472 lb. for 1933-34 and 187,053 lb. for 1934-35. The basic materials for trinitrotoluene and nitrobenzene are toluene and benzol respectively, and as both are by-products of the coke ovens at Newcastle, the departmental requirements afford a useful market for a commodity which otherwise might be difficult to sell.

The manufacture of cordite has proceeded, and a commencement was made with production of the new Naval cordite. In the filling factory, a variety of projectiles and components have been loaded with the appropriate explosive and orders were executed for reconditioning cartridges and projectiles for the New Zealand Government. Other sections of the factory—cotton waste treatment, general chemical, small component, propellant, and pyrotechnic—showed generally an increase in activities.

There has been a considerable expenditure upon buildings and works, of which a contribution was received from the vote for unemployment relief. The major portion of the work was in connexion with the new Naval cordite factory, and good progress was made with the many new buildings. Some of the plant had to be imported from abroad, but a large proportion was built within the factory, and afforded employment to a number of men.

As a means of reducing dust and also minimizing the risk of fire, trees and shrubs are being freely planted and lawns and grassed areas are being laid out. The protective mounds are planted also with creeping vegetation to obviate erosion by wind and rain. The possibility of dust is almost eliminated, and as a further means of avoiding grass fires, flocks of sheep are maintained to keep the growth under control. In order that the necessity may be self-supporting, the sheep are bred and marketed as if on a farm, and shearing machinery with yards and dipping pens have been installed. The accounts indicate that the transactions were profitable to the extent of £80 during 1934-35.

The number of samples examined by the laboratory section in 1933-34 was 4,636, involving 11,179 separate determinations, and during 1934-35 the figures were 6,359 and 15,606 respectively.

The operation of an explosives factory necessitates provision of complete changes of clothing, including underclothing, for many of the employees, and all employees are provided with overalls. This involves laundry arrangements, and a small section has been equipped for that purpose. Lately drying and folding rooms have been erected to ensure independence upon weather conditions. During 1934-35, 62,800 articles were handled in the laundry, inclusive of items sent in from the other munitions factories.

Particular attention is being paid to prevention against illness and disease, especially where it is liable to arise from contact with toxic substances. Research and experience indicate that such conditions rarely occur where proper precautions are taken, and acknowledgment is made of the assistance given in that respect by the Commonwealth Health Department and Dr. F. R. Kerr, Commonwealth Medical Officer in Melbourne. There has been consequently a considerable reduction in the percentages of cases requiring attention. The figures for sick leave and the expenditure for medical expenses and leave during the respective years were 528 cases and £1,176 12s. 6d. for 1933-34, and 597 and £1,374 19s. 8d. for 1934-35.

A fire occurred in the drying machine at the teasing and drying room in May, 1935, during the drying of cotton waste for army gun-cotton, but was quickly subdued without much damage being done.

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES AND ORDNANCE FACTORY.

Chief Executive Officer and Manager, Ordnance Factory N. K. S. BRODRIBB, O.B.E., F.I.C., A.A.C.I.

The Melbourne group of Munitions Factories comprises the Ammunition Factory, Footscray (gun ammunition and small arms ammunition, non-ferrous metals); Explosives Factory, Maribyrnong (high explosives and propellants, filling, chemicals); the Ordnance Factory, Maribyrnong (guns and carriages, projectiles, woodworking, engineering). The factories, although separately managed, are more or less dependent upon each other for interchange of manufactured components, and thus co-ordination is a continuous requirement. Such co-ordination is exercised at the Administrative Offices which are located in the Ordnance Factory area. The Administrative Offices also administer the Central Drawing Office and the Stores and Transport sections for all munitions supply activities in the Melbourne area, including the Inspection and Laboratories, branches. With the exception of the Ammunition Factory, there is similar responsibility for financial accounts.

At the latter end of the period covered by this report, the first serious steps were taken in Australia for the manufacture of Ordnance, the type decided upon being the 3-in. 20-cwt. anti-aircraft gun with its mounting and travelling platform. It happens that the gun equipment required for first manufacture in Australia is one of the most difficult that could have been selected, and the accomplishment, therefore, will be a test of the technical skill of the staff, and of the provision which has been made for machinery and plant. The results must be awaited, but the progress made so far has been encouraging. When the decision was made, the first step taken was to send the technical officer placed in charge Mr. M. M. O'Loughlin A.M.I.E. (Aust.) to England to confer with the British authorities and investigate their methods. Mr. O'Loughlin left Australia in February, 1934, and returned in January, 1935, and manufacture was commenced immediately. In the first instance, the special steels and metal castings were sent from England by Mr. O'Loughlin, and the first guns and equipment will be made, therefore, from imported materials, but early steps were taken for production of the basic materials in Australia. It is the expectation that further importations will be very much reduced.

The initial operations were commenced in the forge shop and at last the big 1,500-ton hydraulic press, with its attendant furnaces and boilers, was employed upon the purpose for which it was installed nine years ago. The gun forgings came out satisfactorily, and incidentally other heavy forgings such as the breech ring were also produced. The vertical furnace for heat treatment of the gun jackets was also successfully operated for the first time, and there was some relief that these stages had been successfully surmounted. The machining operations came next, and are proceeding. It is expected that it will require two years to complete the first equipment.

Other operations with which the forge shop is concerned are shell bodies, of which thousands have been produced in the hydraulic shell presses, and drop forgings in steel, with some non-ferrous, of which thousands have been made for various purposes. A moderate amount of the forging work is on commercial account, but lately it has been decreasing.

An interesting development was an order to armour-plate a commercial motor car chassis, during which the welding and forming of the bullet-proof steel plate presented some problems. The armoured car was designed as a sample for consideration and test by the military authorities, and trials are proceeding. Other notable manufactures were depth charge cases, portable cranes, lorry trailers, and portable girder bridges. A considerable amount of miscellaneous sheet metal work and aircraft requirements were also produced in the forge shop.

In December, 1934, a new building was completed, of about 1 acre floor space, to be used as a projectile factory, and the shell manufacturing equipment was subsequently installed. It is designed to cope with the mass production of the peace requirements of projectiles, of which there is a variety of sizes and types. The objective has been to lay out lines of plant for the different sizes of shell, and it is expected, when the plan has been completed, that there will be typical working units available for the instruction of commercial manufacturers should emergency necessitate it.

In the machine shop the manufacture of gun components has been an important feature, and appreciable progress was made in the comparatively short period under notice. Difficulties had been experienced in obtaining steels to the prescribed specifications, but they are gradually being surmounted. The manufacturing operations included work for the services, commercial firms, and the Postmaster-General's Department, and useful work was done in the manufacture of air force components and artillery stores. The total value of commercial orders decreased from £1,200 in 1933-34 to £283 during 1934-35.

The Sheet Metal and Aircraft Section has expanded greatly during the period under review, both in amount of work and personnel employed. The most important order was for six fuselages for "Moth" aeroplanes of metal construction. When the report closed the jigs and tools had been made and the fuselages were under construction. Thousands of components were manufactured for Moth, Bulldog, Wapiti and other types of aircraft. Sheet metal work on ambulances and trucks was also carried out for the various services.

The activities of the woodworking shop have shown a steady increase. There has been a great variety of timber products, of which thousands of ammunition boxes formed the principal proportion. There was also artillery and camp equipment such as spokes, feloes, targets, tent poles, picketing gear, gun brushes, leather cases, &c., motor lorry and ambulance bodies, components of aeroplanes, struts, skid planes, &c. A new undertaking was the manufacture of basket containers for carrying loaded ammunition in artillery wagons, in the course of which it was found that a pith cane was more suitable and stronger than the palm-leaf cane formerly specified.

The Central Drawing Office has continued its important function of recording and supplying plans and drawings of the great variety of component parts ordered for production, and of the manufacturing equipment thereby required. The developmental programme has also necessitated a considerable amount of planning of buildings and works, and of mechanical equipment for the new factories.

The volume of work executed during 1934-35 was the greatest since the establishment of the Drawing Office in 1918, the total number of drawings executed being 1,602, while 131,845 copies of all kinds were made. The figures for 1933-34 were 1,091 drawings executed and 111,692 copies of all kinds made. An addition to the records was the compilation of a Products Index of all Munitions Supply Board drawings.

In all other sections of the factory there has been an increased turnover, but the work of the transport section only calls for note. The section is now responsible for removals of household effects of all Commonwealth staff in the metropolitan area of Melbourne, including transfers to the Federal Capital Territory, and the income on account of transport services amounted to £13,112 for 1933-34 and £18,443 for 1934-35. The profits were respectively £91 and £1,485.

Of the 956 casualties treated at the factory casualty room in 1933-34, it was necessary to refer 39 to the medical officer. In 1934-35 there were 1,203 casualties, with 96 references to the medical officer. The existing arrangements provided for a fortnightly visit by the Commonwealth Medical Officer, but the requirements of factory operation render it necessary now that a medical officer should be permanently attached to the works, and steps to that end are being taken.

SMALL ARMS FACTORY.

Manager—A. S. FORD, A.M.I.MECH.E., A.M.Am.Soc.M.E., A.M.I.E. (AUST.).

The manufacture of Vickers machine guns, of which there are three patterns in production, is the principal activity at the Small Arms Factory. The land pattern gun is now in full routine, and the output is satisfactory and upon good economic basis. A second gun, taken out of one of the later batches, was sent to England for critical examination and a very satisfactory report was received. It was previously reported that the air pattern gun had been taken in hand and during the period of the report the "right-hand" type had been carried through to completion with delivery of the first batch. The air pattern right-hand gun contains 207 components, of which 118 were common to the land pattern, and nine more had to be converted. There were consequently 80 new components for which tools and gauges had to be designed. The number of drawings for tools and gauges, &c., was thus 907. A necessity with the air pattern gun is a 66 per cent. increase in the rate of fire, and that was achieved in the firing tests, a maximum of 1,035 rounds per minute having been attained, with average of 985 rounds per minute. Work is proceeding with the air pattern "left-hand" gun, but the progress is more protracted owing to there being a reversal of the loading and firing arrangements, with the consequence that the number of components common with other types is reduced to 89. That involves considerably more tools and gauges, &c.

The manufacture of rifles, which had been suspended in 1929, was resumed in August, 1933, and has proved to be a difficult task owing largely to the loss of expert knowledge on the part of the employees. The experience indicates that it is unwise to suspend a steady progression of manufacturing where methods of mass production of small components are involved. It has become evident that there should be always even a small quantity going through the machines, and through the hands of employees, if ever a quick resumption of production should be deemed a matter of expectation. The production and assembly of components is proceeding, and some rifles with appurtenances have been delivered. It was disclosed during the course of the operations that some of the machinery, now nearly 25 years old, must be replaced in the near future.

Other work for the department included short heavy barrels, mainly for Rifle Clubs, and the conversion of Rifles No. 1. The receipts for those purposes were £5,929 in 1933-34 and £2,658 in 1934-35. For the Air Board work was done to the extent of £200 in 1933-34 and £1,555 in 1934-35. Orders from other Commonwealth Departments, mainly artificial limb parts, amounted to £590 in 1933-34 and £284 in 1934-35. The manufactures in assistance of commercial firms continued upon a substantial basis and the receipts were £11,736 in 1933-34 and £11,605 in 1934-35. The bulk of the orders were for sheep-shearing equipment, but there was a considerable proportion of tools and manufacturing gear, and of partly-manufactured goods to be worked up by the ordering parties. The factory does not undertake work which can be produced satisfactorily in some other Australian establishment.

During 1934-35, as a measure of unemployment relief, works were undertaken which involved the employment of several hundred men. Materials were provided out of factory funds and wages were paid from a special vote. The principal item was excavation of a site for a proposed new building to replace certain temporary structures erected during the war and there was also some concrete kerbing and flooring. The expenditure amounted to £4,925 out of the £5,000 allotted.

The factory power plant was improved and extended during the period. The bulk electric supply is obtained from the State power station at Lithgow, but a large steam installation is required for factory operations and a moderate amount of electric current is thereby generated to balance with the purchased current. A boiler erected in the previous year was brought into operation during 1933-34 and two smaller boilers erected in 1911 were demolished. A new 250 k.v.a. alternator was ordered to take the place of a 150 k.w. direct current generator which was removed from the steam unit, and switchboard alterations were made to suit the change over from direct-current to alternating-current.

There were 53 accidents of a minor nature in 1933-34, which involved payment of £720 in leave and injury pay, but only in one case did the leave extend over one month. In 1934-35 the cost of sick leave and injury pay was £1,087 and the accidents amounted to 45, of which three necessitated leave of more than one month.

Mr. J. D. Statton, Assistant Manager, was transferred on 24th January, 1934, to the Ordnance Factory, Maribyrnong. Mr. Statton had been connected with the factory since 1909, prior to its establishment, when he was selected to visit America for training in the manufacture of small arms. Mr. C. H. Underwood, Foreman of the Viewing Section, who joined the staff shortly after inception of the factory, proceeded on furlough prior to retirement on 17th June, 1935.

PRODUCTION.

The operations of the Munitions Factories are directed not only to the manufacture of goods in fulfilment of orders from the Naval, Military and Air services and from other outside authorities, but there is also a considerable portion of the staff engaged in the manufacture and production of tools, machines and other requirements used within the factories for the conduct or improvement of manufacturing facilities. The following figures, accordingly, include manufacture of equipment and values of other services for which there has been some remuneration, or which has added to the capital investment:—

INDUSTRIAL.

The Industrial Officer of the Department of Defence acts for the Munitions Supply Board in matters relating to industrial arbitration, and has submitted the following brief review of the industrial conditions in the several factories at the date this Report closed.

SMALL ARMS FACTORY.

The Commonwealth Public Service Arbitrator's Determination continues to regulate the wages and conditions of employment of employees of the Small Arms Factory, and all classes of employment are now included in the determination. The wages are subject to quarterly adjustment on Statistician's figures, the base rate being £3 12s. 6d. (a decrease of 1s. from previous quarter), until 1st May, 1934, when it was reduced to £3 12s.

Under the Financial Emergency Act there was also a reduction of wages by 10 per cent., which operated until 19th October, 1933, when the deduction became approximately 7½ per cent., with the proviso that no adult male or junior married employee should be reduced below the equivalent of £174 per annum unless a determination prescribed a lower rate of wages.

In April, 1934, the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration adopted a new table, based on the Statistician's cost of living index numbers, all items, "C" series, for the purpose of fixing the base rate. At the same time the Court eliminated the provision for reduction of wages by 10 per cent. To ensure similar treatment for the factory employees, the Arbitrator was requested to vary the determination by including the new adjustment table and basic wage. However, in approving the table, the Arbitrator deviated from the Court's method of fixing the provincial towns' basic wage at 3s. below the metropolitan basic wage, and determined that the factory basic wage should be the monetary equivalent to the Statistician's cost of living index number, "C" series, for five towns, New South Wales. It resulted in a basic wage 3s. per week higher than that recommended by the Federal Arbitration Court for the same locality. The determination operated from 19th July, 1934, and the base rate—£3 12s., less 7½ per cent. = £3 7s. 1d.—was thereby increased to £3 8s. per week. That rate has continued to date.

Concurrently with the operation of the determination, the Minister administering the Financial Emergency Act approved that its provisions should cease to operate in respect of the employees concerned. Thus full award rates were paid, bringing the employees into line with those paid under Federal Arbitration Court Awards.

The unions submitted claims to the Arbitrator for the grant of two increases of £6 child endowment, with increased recreation and sick leave, but the claims were opposed, in pursuance of departmental policy that trade conditions and wages should apply to employees of munitions establishments. The Arbitrator refused the first three claims but approved an agreement whereby employees will be granted four days' sick leave in each year, and leave not availed of during the period it accrues will be allowed to accumulate. Other unimportant variations of the determination were made during the period.

MARYBYRNONG AND FOOTSCRAY.

The agreement made on 8th January, 1931, continues to operate for employees of the Marybyrnong and Footscray establishments, and generally has proved satisfactory to all parties. However, the period of three years for which the agreement was to operate has now expired and action is being taken to secure a new agreement. Owing to the increased activities at these establishments, additional trades have been introduced with employees holding membership of unions not now parties to the agreement, and an endeavour will be made to extend the agreement to include such employees. The basic wage is adjusted quarterly and follows the Federal Arbitration Court's method of adjusting the basic wage. From 1st August, 1933, the male base rate was £3 9s. 10d.; 1st November, 1933, £3 10s. 4d.; 1st February, 1934, £3 10s. 10d. Until 19th October, 1933, all wages were reduced under the Financial Emergency Act by 10 per cent. and after that date, and until 26th April, 1934, by approximately 7½ per cent.

In April, 1934, following the Federal Arbitration Court's new method of ascertaining the male basic wage, based on the Statistician's cost of living index numbers, all items, "C" series, by arrangement with the unions, the table and basic wage were incorporated in the agreement and the Minister in charge of the Financial Emergency Act approved that its provisions should cease to operate on employees' wages subject to a proviso that the new rates should be lower by at least 17½ per cent. of the 1st July, 1930, rates. It resulted in the majority of employees enjoying full wages.

Under the new table the male base wage was £3 4s. from 26th April, 1934, to 6th March, 1935, and £3 6s. from 7th March, 1935. As from 19th July, 1934, the Financial Emergency Act ceased to apply to wages of all employees of munitions establishments.

The wages of adult female employees are adjusted annually from 1st August, and the basic wage was £2 1s. 6d. per week during the period under review. The Financial Emergency Act operated to reduce wages by 10 per cent. until 19th October, 1933, and by 7½ per cent. from that date until 26th April, 1934, when the Financial Emergency Act ceased to operate on these employees' wages.

CLOTHING FACTORY.

The majority of employees at the Clothing Factory work under the Federal Arbitration Court award for clothing trades.

The wages vary half-yearly and the base rate was as follows:—1st July, 1933—Males, £3 12s. 8d., less 10 per cent.; females, £2 0s. 6d., less 10 per cent.; 1st January, 1934—Males, £3 11s. 1d., less 10 per cent.; females, £1 19s. 6d., less 10 per cent.

As from 26th April, 1934, the Federal Arbitration Court instituted a new method of ascertaining the basic wage by adopting the Statistician's cost of living index numbers, all items, "C" series, and, at the same time, cancelled the provision for reduction of wages by 10 per cent., and that resulted in the following base rates—26th April, 1934—Males, £3 0s.; females, £1 19s. 7th June, 1934—Males, £3 8s.; females, £1 18s. and without change until 6th June, 1935, when rate advanced to—Males, £3 10s.; females, £1 19s.

The few canvas workers employed are paid under the appropriate Federal Arbitration Court award and wages vary quarterly, while storemen are paid the local State determination rates.

EMPLOYMENT.

A return of the staffs and employees engaged in the establishments administered by the Munitions Supply Board as at 30th June, 1934, is as follows:—

FINANCIAL.

The Clothing Factory only is being operated on a basis of entire self-support. The remainder of the factories, being maintained for purposes of national emergency, are designed upon a scale larger than is required for ordinary peace demands, and it is necessary that the finances should be supported out of special votes included in the Defence Estimates. In 1932-33 the amount was £160,700, but in 1933-34 it had been increased to £272,650, and for 1934-35 it was £341,989.

The increased expenditures indicated in the statements are due almost entirely to the increased activities which have been explained in the course of this Report. An exception relates to "Depreciation", which becomes greatly increased in the accounts of 1934-35. It is explained that for a number of years, when the factories were being maintained upon a "nucleus" basis, with only a moderate production, and consequently with but little wear upon the plant, there was no regular application of a depreciation charge. Instead, items of plant were written down or written off as circumstances dictated in relation to the particular item. With a resumption of manufacturing upon an extended scale, the ordinary principles of charges on account of "depreciation" are being applied, and thus a substantial amount is now disclosed. It is considered that notwithstanding the cessation for a number of years of an annual charge for depreciation, the valuation of plant given in the statement of assets and liabilities printed hereunder is well below an actual value that might be calculated upon present-day costs.

Interest is not allowed for in the transactions of the Munitions Factories, but it is charged into the accounts of the Clothing Factory, which is maintained entirely upon a self-supporting basis. In that respect further reference should be made to the accounts of the factory, which are printed as an addendum to this report. The item of "Interest" shown in the summary relating to the Ammunition Factory refers to interest being paid in connexion with the purchase of the assets of the Colonial Ammunition Company Limited, details of which have been given in the report for 1926-27.

Arising out of the votes granted for support of the Munitions Factories, there are certain manufactures produced, which are placed at the disposal of the services without charge. By allowing for such manufactures at the cost of production, and for other credits arising from the sale of products, the charge upon the public for operation of the factories as portion of the Defence measures may be determined. The net operation cost has proved to be £169,685 for 1932-33, £196,104 for 1933-34, and £262,696 for 1934-35. Incidentally, if the increase in "Depreciation"—£64,074—should be disregarded, the operation cost for 1934-35 would work out at £198,622, suggesting that with the increase in production, there should be a relative decrease of operating costs.

The capital investment in the munitions establishments is set out in statement of assets and liabilities following. At the date the Report closed—30th June, 1935—the total investment was £3,534,100, the details of which compare with previous years as follows:—

The increases in items of assets arise principally out of the developmental programme commenced during the period, and partly out of plant additions constructed in the factories in the course of their manufacturing activities. Likewise, the values for "stocks on hand" and "work in progress" have advanced. The "Debits" are owing mainly by departments and services, and will be collected early in the succeeding year. The "Cash" consists mainly of advances to the factories to pay for goods ordered, or of deposits by the factories to pay for materials ordered but not delivered.

The "Amount due to the Treasury" represents the public money invested in the Munitions Supply organization. The item "Other Liabilities" relates principally to progress payments, covered on the "Assets" side as "Cash", advanced by various departments for the purpose of financing orders placed. There are also small amounts due to "Sundry Creditors" representing amounts due for wages or materials purchased.

COMMERCIAL WORK.

The acceptance of orders for commercial work dates from 1920, when the Commonwealth found itself, on the cessation of war activities, with considerable manufacturing capacity and a large number of employees who could not be found useful employment in making ordinary Defence requirements. The difficulty was accentuated by the large accumulations of stocks made on war account or brought back to Australia by the returning troops. The practice had been accepted in England of allowing the Government factories to accept orders for commercial work, and the Government here, for the same reasons, authorized the practice with limitations.

In pursuance of the policy, the Commonwealth Government Clothing Factory was permitted to accept orders for uniform clothing from Government Departments of the State of Victoria, and the Tramway Board and other public bodies. Later, because of the facilities available for manufacture of uniform clothing, and particularly because of a heavy decrease in departmental requirements in the early depression years, orders were also accepted from other bodies of a semi-public nature, such as the Boy Scouts Association, St. John's Ambulance, Navy League, Municipal Bands, &c. In 1930-31 an analysis of the goods supplied shows that they were distributed as follows:—Commonwealth Departments, £69,589 (as against £165,935 in 1925-26); Victorian Government Departments, £10,861; other public utilities such as Tramway and Municipal Bodies, £7,429; other organizations and individuals such as Boy Scouts, &c., £1,220—a total of £89,099. By this time the employees had been reduced to 286, including staff—a number well below the minimum considered necessary for the efficient operation of the factory as a going concern.

In June, 1933, a writ was served upon the Commonwealth by the State of Victoria, at the relation of the Victorian Chamber of Manufacturers, applying to the High Court for a declaration that the manufacture and supply of goods to the State of Victoria and other bodies was beyond the powers of the Commonwealth, and seeking an injunction. The parties having agreed as to the facts and as to the grounds for argument, the matter came on for hearing before a Justice of the High Court in November, 1934, and was remitted by him for argument before the Full Court. The matter was argued before the Full Court in February, 1935, at which Sir Edward Mitchell, K.C., the Right Honourable J. G. Latham, K.C., and Mr. W. K. Fullagar, K.C., instructed by the Commonwealth Crown Solicitor, appeared for the Commonwealth, and judgment was delivered on 23rd May, 1935. By a majority of four Justices to one, a decision was given in favour of the Commonwealth. The pith of the decision is contained in the following extract from a joint judgment by the Chief Justice and two Justices:—

It is obvious that the maintenance of a factory to make naval and military equipment is within the field of legislative power. The method of its internal organization in time of peace is largely a matter for determination by those to whom is entrusted the sole responsibility for the conduct of naval and military defence. In particular, the retention of all members of a specially trained and specially efficient staff might well be considered necessary, and it might well be thought that the policy involved in such retention could not be effectively carried out unless that staff was fully engaged. Consequently, the sales of clothing to bodies outside the regular naval and military forces are not to be regarded as the main or essential purpose of this part of the business, but as incidents in the maintenance for war purposes of an essential part of the munitions branch of the defence arm. In such a matter, much must be left to the discretion of the Governor-General and the responsible Ministers.

GENERAL.

The two years' period covered by this Report, 1st July, 1933, to 30th June, 1935, has become notable as the period of recovery from the worst effects of the industrial depression. Within the establishments administered by the Munitions Supply Board it has been a time of greatly increased activity, both in manufacturing and in improving the facilities for production. A comparison between 1932-33 and 1934-35 shows that the values of goods produced amounted respectively to £334,491 and £502,138; that salaries and wages were £260,953 and £333,128; and that on the final days of the respective years the employees numbered 1,413 and 2,349. During the period the buildings and plant were extended to the amounts respectively of £71,449 and £84,634, and other expenditures on the same account are proceeding. The results to be gained from these developments are that, the measures for defence being strengthened, the country is becoming less dependent upon abroad for its requirements of munitions and other materials; and an export trade is being developed out of the sale of certain classes of munitions to another Dominion. That the Munitions Supply organization has its economic value will be evident from the consideration that at one time nearly the whole of the expenditure upon production would have been sent abroad. There is still much to be done before an assurance can be given that all practicable self-containment has been secured, but proposals to that end are under consideration.

AND 1934-35.

I beg to submit the following, covering the operations of the Commonwealth Government Clothing Factory for the financial years 1933-34 and 1934-35.

The factory is established for the manufacture and supply of uniform clothing, canvas goods, &c., for the Defence Forces of the Commonwealth. It is also utilized for the same purpose by Commonwealth and State Departments and other public bodies.

The total values of the product manufactured by the factory since the commencement of operations and the profits made are as under:—

The factory is entirely self-supporting. All expenditure, including salaries of staff, is borne from earnings. In addition there is a charge upon the working capital of interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum. The accounts also contain adequate provision for depreciation.

The value of the assets of the factory amounts to £78,109 consisting of land, buildings, plant, stores, sundry debtors, deposits on contracts, &c. The depreciation allowed from the inception of the factory to the 30th June, 1935, amounts to £33,448.

Of the £15,669 shown as "Other Liabilities" £12,910 is cash advanced for orders for military clothing, &c., to be executed in 1935-36.

The upkeep expenses are detailed in the financial statements attached, which are self-explanatory. Included are "Holiday pay and military leave"—mainly wages paid for statutory holidays and recreation leave; "Repairs and maintenance of land buildings" and "Maintenance of machinery and plant" are charges for upkeep; "Power, heat and light" includes the cost of electric power for driving motors, and for the pressing irons, &c.; "Wages" is the cost of labour actually engaged in the manufacture of product, and also wages paid to storemen, packers, watchmen, &c.

The salaries and wages paid amounted to £42,862 for 1933-34 and £60,952 for 1934-35. The distribution of wages for 1934-35 was—Productive labour, 79 per cent.; holiday pay, 6 per cent.; non-productive labour, 15 per cent.

The period has been a particularly busy one in regard to departmental requirements arising out of changes in naval uniform clothing, and of completely new patterns for military clothing. There was also a large increase of orders from officers and others in connexion with the centenary celebrations in Victoria and the associated visit of His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester. Every effort was made to maintain and, if possible, improve the standards of manufactures and with rejections now almost reduced to a minimum it is considered that a great measure of success has been achieved.

The policy of replacing out-of-date plant and machinery with modern machinery has been steadily carried out. The whole of the buildings and plant have been kept in a proper state of repair and wherever possible improvements have been effected.

Steps have been taken to set up direct representation in the Military Districts, and depots have now been established in the 1st, 2nd, 4th and 5th Military Districts with a full-time tailor employed in the 2nd District and part-time tailors in the remaining Districts. The scheme is still under trial and promises a means of dealing locally with many matters which otherwise must be sent to the factory in Melbourne. The depots are under the direct supervision of the Secretaries of the District Contract Boards in the respective States, and their assistance and co-operation in matters affecting the factory are acknowledged.

I am pleased to state that amicable relations between the management and the employees continue to be maintained, and the factory has been singularly free from any industrial differences.

I desire also to express my acknowledgment of the efficient service of office and workroom staffs. That the output has been so greatly increased with a general improvement in quality is due largely to their loyal support.
