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PREFACE

This Paper presents information on the Commonwealth Government's financial relations with other levels of government.

Relationship with Other Budget Papers and Terminology Employed in this Paper

In examining government finances, the most relevant aggregates for economic analysis are usually those relating to payments on a net basis — that is, after repayments of Commonwealth Government loans and sinking fund contributions by the States and Territories in respect of borrowings by the Commonwealth on their account. In Budget Paper No 1, this distinction is evident in the use of the term 'payment' as a gross measure and the term 'outlay' as a net measure, an approach that is also adopted in other budget papers and the national accounts. However, repayments lag the initial advances and, in many cases, are made in respect of programs which have already terminated. Moreover, the direct relationship between repayments and the programs to which they nominally relate is not always clear. Largely for these reasons, this Paper focuses on payments on a gross basis, although tables showing repayments are included.

In this Paper, 'payment' is also used as a generic term to describe the flow of both grants and advances (loans) from the Commonwealth to the States, Territories and local government authorities. The use of the term 'payment' in this manner is consistent with this Paper's emphasis on gross flows and with its use in Budget Paper No 1. In instances where the net measure is more appropriate, the term 'net payment' is used.

Statement 6 of Budget Paper No 1 reviews developments in public sector finances and provides a framework for analysing the combined impact of transactions by all levels of government on the Australian economy. This complements the discussion in Chapter II of this Paper on the 'Structure and Trends in Commonwealth/State Financial Relations'.

Treatment of the Territories

The Northern Territory became a self-governing Territory on 1 July 1978 under the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978. It has outlays responsibilities and revenue raising powers similar to those of a State. Although the Northern Territory is not a State under the Constitution, it operates under financial arrangements that are the same as, or modelled on, arrangements with the six States.

The Australian Capital Territory became a self-governing Territory on 11 May 1989 under the Australian Capital Territory (Self-Government) Act 1988. The Australian Capital Territory has responsibility for functions usually discharged by both State and local government. However, expenditures in the Territory for national purposes — for

example, maintenance in the Parliamentary Triangle — continue to be financed from the Commonwealth Budget.

Like the Northern Territory, the Australian Capital Territory is not a State under the Constitution, although the Commonwealth's financial relations with the Australian Capital Territory are being transferred to a basis comparable with those for the States. Prior to May 1989, the Australian Capital Territory finances were included in the Commonwealth Budget. In preparation for self-government, a separate system of Australian Capital Territory accounts within the Commonwealth Budget — an Australian Capital Territory 'fiscus' — was established on 1 July 1988. On 11 May 1989 balances held in the Commonwealth's Australian Capital Territory accounts were transferred to the Australian Capital Territory Government.

In this Paper, the reporting of the Australian Capital Territory's financial transactions for 1988-89 does not correspond with that for Budget Paper No 1 because of the differing treatments of payments into and out of the Australian Capital Territory fiscus during the period from its establishment until self-government. In Budget Paper No 1:

- the subventions made prior to self-government are classified as internal budget transfers and not as outlays;
- outlays from the Australian Capital Territory fiscus are treated as outlays by the Commonwealth; and
- the transfer of the balances held in the Commonwealth's Australian Capital Territory accounts to the Australian Capital Territory Government have been classified as transfers to other governments.

On the other hand, data for the Australian Capital Territory in this Paper are presented on a basis that provide for a more useful comparison of 1988-89 and later year figures:

- amounts paid into the Australian Capital Territory fiscus in 1988-89 that is, prior to self-government are treated as payments to the Australian Capital Territory; and
- to avoid double counting, payments to the Australian Capital Territory of the balances held in the Commonwealth's Australian Capital Territory trust accounts on 11 May 1989 are not treated as payments to the Australian Capital Territory, as these amounts reflect receipts of payments and own source revenues into the Australian Capital Territory fiscus prior to self-government.

As a result of these adjustments, comparable data on Australian Capital Territory payments are available from 1988-89.

Population Figures Used in this Paper

The population series underlying *per capita* estimates in this Paper are, with the exception of 1991-92 and 1992-93, the mean resident populations for the financial year published by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in *Australian Demographic Statistics* (Catalogue No 3101.0). The ABS estimates of population at 31 December 1991 have been used for 1991-92, and Treasury projections of populations at 31 December 1992 for 1992-93.

Much of the data presented in Chapter II are sourced from unpublished ABS public finance statistics. Some of the data presented in Chapter III are drawn from the Commonwealth Grants Commission's Report on General Revenue Grant Relativities 1992 Update. Additional material on specific purpose payments, discussed in Chapter V, is available from the Catalogue of Specific Purpose Payments to the States and Territories, 1991-92 (Commonwealth Relations Secretariat, Department of Prime Minister and Cabinet, January 1992).

Style Conventions

The following style conventions are employed in this Paper:

- the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory are referred to as the 'Territories'. References to the 'States' or 'each State' include the Northern Territory but exclude the Australian Capital Territory. References to the 'six States' refer to the six States under the Constitution:
- the State and local government sector is denoted as the 'State/local sector'.
 References to the 'State/local sector' and the 'State government sector' include the Australian Capital Territory and Northern Territory unless otherwise stated;
- figures in tables, and generally in the text, have been rounded. Discrepancies in tables between totals and sums of components should reflect rounding. Percentage changes in all tables are based on the underlying unrounded amounts and not the rounded amounts;
- the following notations are used in the tables:
 - na not available
 - .. zero, or rounded to zero
 - indicating negative figures; and
- the following abbreviations are used for names of the States and Territories, where appropriate:

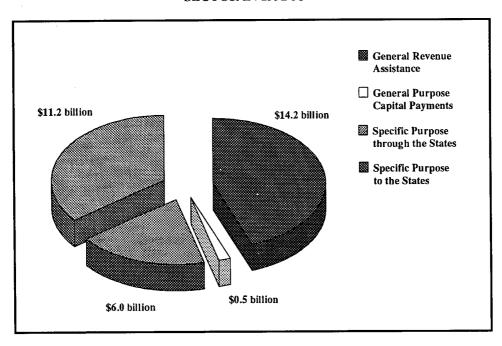
CHAPTER I: SUMMARY OF COMMONWEALTH FINANCIAL RELATIONS WITH THE STATES, TERRITORIES AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

This chapter provides an overview of the Commonwealth's financial relations with the State/local sector.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE TO THE STATES, TERRITORIES AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT

A central feature of Australia's federal fiscal arrangements (discussed more fully in Chapter II) is the considerable flow of Commonwealth financial assistance to other levels of government. This reflects the **vertical fiscal imbalance** between the Commonwealth and the States with regard to relative expenditure responsibilities and revenue capacities. Although the Commonwealth collects around 70 per cent of total public sector revenues, it is responsible for less than 50 per cent of outlays.

(a) Payments direct to local government are included in general revenue assistance.

Chart 1 illustrates the major categories of payments to the State/local sector.

- General revenue assistance comprises financial assistance grants and special revenue assistance grants (the latter provided either on account of special financial circumstances or on an interim basis to fund the transfer of certain Commonwealth programs). The Australian Capital Territory receives general revenue grants broadly equivalent to financial assistance grants to the States. These grants are untied that is, they are available to the States and Territories to be used in accordance with their own budgetary priorities and constitute the largest single intergovernmental transfer. In 1992-93 general revenue assistance will account for approximately 50 per cent of total estimated net payments to the States.
- General purpose capital payments are grants provided to assist with States' capital outlays. They form a relatively small component of total payments to the States. Like general revenue assistance, they are not subject to conditions on their use by the States. Details regarding both the level and distribution of general revenue assistance and general purpose capital grants are provided in Chapter III.
- Specific purpose payments are made to assist States in meeting expenditures for purposes designated by the Commonwealth and/or are conditional upon the States and Territories agreeing to provide particular services or to undertake particular projects. Almost all such payments are provided as grants. In addition to specific purpose payments made directly to State (and Territory) Governments, these payments also include payments through State Governments, which the latter are obliged to pass on to other bodies (including local government) and individuals. Details are provided in Chapter V.

Prior to 1988-89, Commonwealth assistance to the States also comprised advances (loans). Such advances largely related to the proceeds of borrowings undertaken by the Commonwealth prior to 1986-87 on behalf of the States. Annual **repayments** against these advances affect the level of net payments to the States and Territories. In particular, under arrangements that commenced in 1990-91, the States and Territories are progressively taking over full responsibility for debt previously raised by the Commonwealth on their behalf.

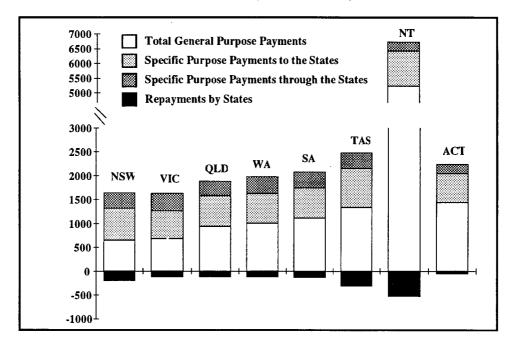
The Commonwealth makes payments to local government via:

- General purpose assistance, analogous to the 'untied' general purpose assistance
 provided to the State sector. These grants are paid through the States which are
 required to pass on the whole amount to local government authorities. The
 Australian Capital Territory receives comparable assistance in respect of its local
 government functions; and
- Direct payments, made to local government authorities under various Commonwealth expenditure programs, which account for around 1½ per cent of estimated Commonwealth payments to other levels of government in 1992-93. For 1992-93, direct payments to local government will include \$245m for the local

capital works program (see the Treasurer's statement, Working for the Future, August, 1992).

Table 1 details the total payments each State receives from the Commonwealth under each category, while Table 2 and Chart 2 provide details on a *per capita* basis.

LOAN COUNCIL ARRANGEMENTS

The level of borrowings by the States and Territories each year is the subject of consideration by the Australian Loan Council, which determines annual 'global' limits on borrowings by the State and Territories in respect of semi-government and local authorities, and government owned companies and trusts. Commonwealth authorities' borrowings are also subject to global borrowing limits.

On 12 June 1992, Loan Council agreed to a 10 per cent increase in the States' and Territories' aggregate basic global borrowing limits for 1992-93. Prior to this, the global limits for the States and Territories had been constant in nominal terms since 1989-90. In addition to the basic global borrowing limits, the Loan Council meeting also approved a number of special additions for particular projects in individual States (see Chapter IV for details). Loan Council also agreed to effect a number of changes to the operation of the Global Approach. (Chapter IV provides a detailed discussion of the Loan Council arrangements.)

BOX 1—1992 PREMIERS' CONFERENCE AND LOAN COUNCIL MEETINGS

The level and distribution of general purpose payments and the global borrowing limits are determined each year at the Premiers' Conference and Loan Council meetings. The **key funding decisions** of the 1992 meetings on 12 June were:

- a 'one-off' augmentation of \$166m to the base level of financial assistance grants (FAGs), consistent with the previously agreed real terms guarantee for 1991-92 to 1993-94, for the States and Northern Territory. Possible longer term financial arrangements are to be considered at the 1993 meetings, when governments will have before them a report from Heads of Treasuries on the medium term budgetary outlook for both the Commonwealth and the States, including an assessment of cyclical and structural elements;
- for 1992-93 only, distribution of the base level of FAGs according to the 1992-93 per capita relativities recommended by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, while States will receive the higher of their share of the 'one-off' addition to the FAGs pool based on either the use of the Commission's relativities or an equal per capita share, pending a review of longer term distributional issues at the 1993 meetings. (The Commonwealth's initial offer, of an additional \$150m, was increased to \$166m to accommodate this compromise.);
- maintenance of the level of general purpose capital grants provided under the State Government Loan Council programs at the same nominal level as for 1991-92;
- special revenue assistance of \$139m to compensate Victoria for its loss of revenue resulting from the Commonwealth's decision, taken earlier this year, not to share Petroleum Resource Rent Tax (PRRT) revenue with the States;
- special revenue assistance of \$40m for the Northern Territory, funded from the financial assistance grants pool;
- general revenue assistance for the Australian Capital Territory based upon the 1992-93 per capita relativity assessed by the Commonwealth Grants Commission, together with special revenue assistance of \$15m to assist in financing public sector restructuring initiatives; and
- a 10 per cent increase in the States' aggregate basic global borrowing limits to \$4.2 billion, together with some special temporary additions.

Further details of these funding decisions and related issues considered at the 1992 Premiers' Conference and Loan Council meetings are in Chapters III and IV. Chapter II provides a description of the relevant institutional arrangements.

CHAPTER II: STRUCTURE AND TRENDS IN COMMONWEALTH/STATE FINANCIAL RELATIONS

This chapter reviews financial relations between the three levels of government and analyses recent developments in the State/local sector.

STRUCTURE OF THE PUBLIC SECTOR

Chart 3 compares the Commonwealth, State and local government sectors in terms of key financial aggregates and their contribution to the overall level of activity and employment within the economy for 1991-92. As is evident from the chart, the State/local sector accounts for a substantial component of total public sector outlays, employment and final demand.

- After transfers to other levels of government, the Commonwealth spends about half
 of its remaining outlays on personal benefit payments. These payments are to
 individuals and do not add directly to public sector demand or resource use (other
 than for administration costs). Consequently, the Commonwealth accounts for
 only around a third of public sector final demand and about a quarter of
 public sector employment while being responsible for about half of public
 sector own purpose outlays.
- The State/local sector's contribution to public sector employment and final demand reflects its responsibility for the provision of services in areas that are relatively labour intensive such as education, health, and law and order.

Levels and patterns of spending by the State/local sector therefore have a major influence on Australia's economic performance.

Chart 3 also underscores the imbalance, between revenue raising and own purpose expenditure responsibilities, in Australia's federal system.

- The Commonwealth accounts for around 70 per cent of public sector revenue but only 50 per cent of public sector outlays when transfers to other levels of government are excluded.
- The State sector directly accounts for 27 per cent of public sector revenue and is responsible for 45 per cent of total public sector outlays (excluding transfers to the local sector).

This imbalance gives rise to significant financial transfers from the Commonwealth to the State and local sectors. Payments from the Commonwealth to the State/local sector account for about 27 per cent of Commonwealth sector outlays and about 39 per cent of

revenues for the State/local sector. Such payments effectively fund approximately 40 per cent of State and Territory outlays and 15 per cent of local government outlays.

CHART 3: PUBLIC SECTOR FINANCIAL AGGREGATES AND EMPLOYMENT SHARES — 1991-92

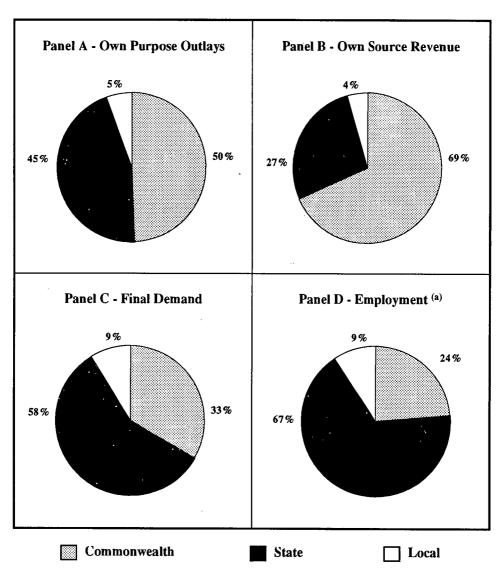
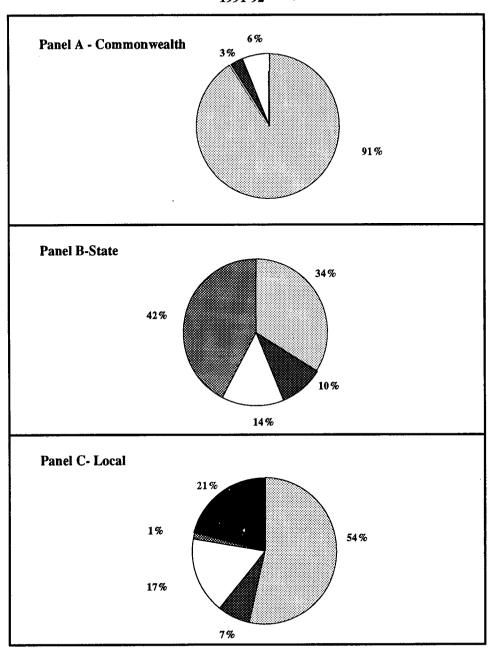


Chart 4 identifies the revenue sources for each of the three levels of government in 1991-92.

STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL AGGREGATES

This section canvasses Commonwealth/State financial relations in the overall framework of macroeconomic policy; discusses trends in the main financial aggregates in the State/local sector; and compares developments between the State sector and local government sector. The analysis examines the State and local sector as a whole and considers the Public Trading Enterprise (PTE) sector separately¹.

COMMONWEALTH/STATE FINANCIAL RELATIONS AND POLICY OBJECTIVES

Commonwealth and State policies — and the relationship between them — are central to the achievement of national policy objectives.

The Commonwealth general government sector plays a primary role in deciding on and implementing both the macroeconomic management and distributional elements of fiscal policy. Each level of government, however, affects the conduct and effectiveness of fiscal policy. In particular, and as noted above, while the Commonwealth raises the bulk of government revenue, the State/local sector exerts an important influence on resource allocation and the level of activity by virtue of its greater contribution to public sector final demand (including public sector infrastructure) and employment.

The Commonwealth's macroeconomic responsibilities necessarily require a focus on the overall financial position of the total public sector. Changes in the level of Commonwealth payments to the State/local sector are an important means by which the Commonwealth can seek to influence the stance of fiscal policy.

As a consequence, the Commonwealth's financial relations with the State/local sector seek to encourage consistency in fiscal policy between each level of government. Box 2 provides an outline of the institutional arrangements governing the financial relationships between the three tiers of government.

The size of the State PTE sector underscores the importance of structural reforms in that sector to improve overall economic performance. Most States have addressed, or are addressing, inefficiencies within their PTE sector. This has included significant corporatisation and privatisation programs that will have longer term benefits for both the State budgets and the economy in general.

BOX 2 — INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS

The framework for the management of financial arrangements in Australia has evolved over many years.

- Discussions between governments at the annual **Premiers' Conference** determine both the level and distribution of general purpose assistance.
- The Commonwealth Grants Commission (an independent statutory body established in 1933) recommends per capita relativities for the interstate distribution of general revenue assistance. This is done with a view to compensating States for relative revenue and expenditure disabilities that affect their capacity to provide an average level and range of public services so-called horizontal fiscal equalisation. As discussed in Chapter III, governments have agreed to review the Grants Commission's processes at the 1993 Premiers' Conference in the light of concerns expressed regarding the complexity and appropriateness of the Commission's methodology, and the implications for economic efficiency.
- The amount and distribution of specific purpose payments are usually determined in the Commonwealth's budget deliberations. Where appropriate, arrangements regarding the implementation of the relevant programs are the subject of bilateral and/or multilateral discussions between the Commonwealth and the States and Territories (including in the context of the relevant Ministerial Councils or Conferences).
- The Loan Council generally meets on the same day as the Premiers' Conference. Under the terms of the 1927 Financial Agreement, Loan Council is responsible for determining the level of Commonwealth borrowings, both on its own behalf and on behalf of the States. (From 1987-88, no new loans have been advanced by the Commonwealth for the States, the 1990 Loan Council meeting agreed that the States would progressively take responsibility for refinancing Commonwealth debt previously issued on their behalf.) The 'Global Approach' agreed with the States in 1985 sets 'global limits' for all borrowings and related financing arrangements by both Commonwealth and State semi-government authorities that are not subject to the Financial Agreement. More details are in Chapter IV.
- The May 1992 Heads of Government meeting agreed that a Council of Australian Governments be established as a permanent body for ongoing discussions between the Prime Minister, Premiers, Chief Ministers and the President of the Australian Local Government Association. The Council, to be chaired by the Commonwealth, is to meet at least once each year, and will discuss issues currently not covered at the Premiers' Conference.

The States' response to Commonwealth policies is also very important in determining the overall economic impact of public sector activity. Hence, the stance of Commonwealth fiscal policy and, in particular, the level of payments to other tiers of government must reflect judgements as to the relative capacity of each level of government to accommodate the policy adjustments that may be considered necessary.

- The significant restraint in the level of Commonwealth payments exercised through the latter half of the 1980s (see below) was aimed at ensuring that the burden of fiscal adjustment required to bolster national savings was borne equitably by all tiers of government at a time when States' own source revenue was growing strongly.
- More recently, as cyclical factors associated with the recession have resulted in more constrained budgetary positions for both the Commonwealth and the States, the Commonwealth has recognised the need to provide the States with greater stability in terms of the level of financial assistance to assist in budgetary planning.

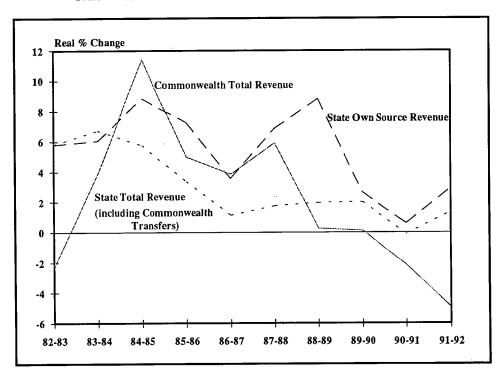


CHART 5: REAL PUBLIC SECTOR REVENUE GROWTH

Chart 5 compares Commonwealth revenue growth through the latter half of the 1980s with trends in both State own source revenue and total revenue (including net Commonwealth payments). Strong growth in State own source revenue was an

important (although temporary and partial) offset to the cuts in Commonwealth payments to the States in the late 1980s.

In the light of recent developments in both the economy and State budgets, the Commonwealth has accelerated the growth in payments to the States while continuing to encourage adjustment by the State/local sector to a more sustainable medium term budgetary position.

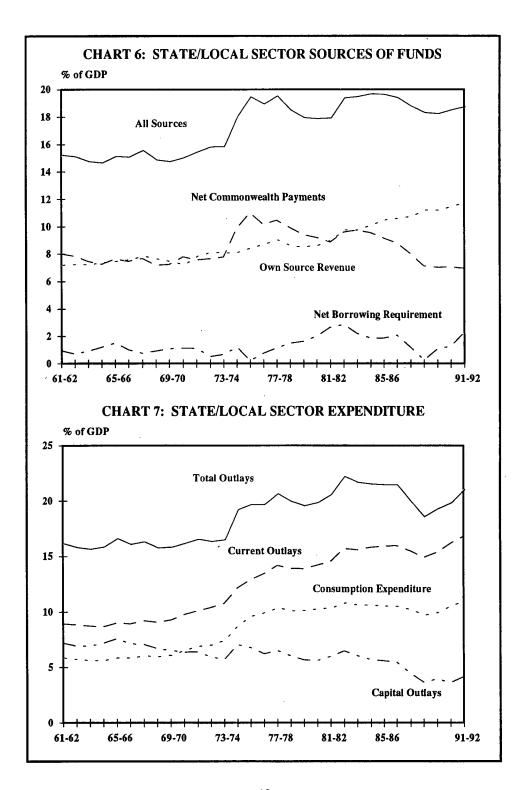
In response to the States' requests for greater certainty and growth in longer term funding arrangements, the May 1992 Heads of Government meeting established a Heads of Treasury working party to report, in time for the 1993 Premiers' Conference, on the medium term budgetary outlook for both the Commonwealth and the States. This report is to include an examination of both structural and cyclical factors. (These processes are discussed in Box 3.)

BOX 3— NATIONAL FISCAL OUTLOOK

The Prime Minister, Premiers and Chief Ministers outlined the medium term budgetary prospects facing their governments at the Heads of Government meeting on 11 May 1992. In essence the States indicated that they faced a very grave budgetary outlook, while the Commonwealth referred to its own constrained budgetary position and the need to ensure that the total public sector's call on resources remained sustainable.

Against this background, a working party of Treasury officers from the Commonwealth and the States was established to report on the medium term budgetary outlook for both the Commonwealth and the States. The report, which will examine the contribution of both structural and cyclical factors, is to be available to assist in a consideration of possible longer term Commonwealth/State financial arrangements at the 1993 Premiers' Conference.

In accordance with understandings reached following the May Heads of Government meeting, discussions at the 1992 Premiers' Conference focused on financial arrangements for 1992-93 only. The Treasuries' working party therefore prepared a preliminary report concentrating on the national fiscal outlook for 1992-93 for the 1992 Premiers' Conference. Preparation of this report has enabled estimates of the State sector's financial position to be prepared with greater confidence than has been the case in the past.



OVERVIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS TO 1991-92

Charts 6 and 7 illustrate longer term trends in key financial aggregates for the State/local sector as a share of GDP, while Tables 3 and 4 record recent developments in the main financial aggregates for the State/local total government sector and for the general government sector. However, the aggregate data mask significant differences in the fiscal performance of individual States. In some cases, those differences detract from the usefulness of the aggregate data in discussing underlying trends.

With that important proviso, the charts highlight the strength of own source revenue through much of the past decade. That has, in turn, facilitated sustained growth in current outlays notwithstanding a steady decline in the contribution of net Commonwealth payments.

- In particular, the period through the latter half of the 1980s was characterised by significant cumulative real declines in the level of Commonwealth net payments, together with substantial reductions in the sector's global borrowing limits.
- In addition to strong growth in own source revenue largely on the back of an unprecedented increase in asset prices the sector's ability to accommodate these fiscal policy adjustments was assisted by restraint in capital outlays (a reflection, inter alia, of sizeable asset sale programs) and the benefits of wage restraint. Wages account for approximately 70 per cent of State/local sector final consumption expenditure.

More recently, the steady gains in the sector's net borrowing requirement (NBR) evident through the earlier part of the 1980s have been largely eroded as the unwinding of asset price inflation has resulted in a sharp decline in own source revenue growth rates (evidenced in Tables 3 and 4). At the same time, pressures on State government services arising from the recession and from the support for some State financial institutions have affected efforts directed towards expenditure restraint.

1991-92

Although only preliminary data for 1991-92 are available, the financial position of the State/local sector appears to have continued to deteriorate in this year. The main points are:

- real outlays growth of 6.5 per cent following average annual growth of 0.9 per cent over the period 1986-87 to 1990-91. This outcome is attributable to, *inter alia*:
 - the budgetary costs associated with recent losses experienced by public sector financial institutions
 - the cost of public sector redundancy packages

increasing debt servicing burdens

and has only been partly offset by the proceeds from asset sales (which are recorded as a negative capital outlay);

- only a modest pick up in growth in own source revenue of 2.9 per cent compared with an average annual increase of 4.5 per cent over the period 1986-87 to 1990-91. This largely reflects subdued revenue from stamp duties and payroll tax; and
- an increase in the net borrowing requirement, from 1.3 per cent of GDP in 1990-91 to 2.3 per cent in 1991-92.

Table 5 provides details of the State/local total sector's capital outlays and related financing transactions. Financing of capital outlays by recourse to the budget deficit declined markedly in the period to 1989-90. Though since having increased, such deficit financing remains well below the levels of the early 1980s. This reflects both the restraint in capital outlays (and an increase in asset sales) and a greater reluctance by some States to fund investment from borrowings.

CHART 8: DEVELOPMENTS IN THE STATE/LOCAL BORROWING REQUIREMENT(a)

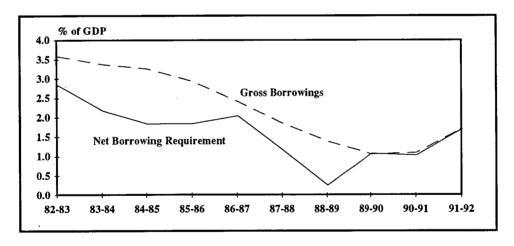


Chart 8 illustrates that the gross borrowings (total new borrowings) consistently exceeded the net borrowing requirement (gross borrowings less increases in holdings of financial assets) in the early 1980s as States built up financial assets. However, since 1989-90 the two measures have been very close.

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Public Trading Enterprise Sector

The financial performance of PTEs has an important impact on State/local sector finances and on the economy in general. In 1990-91 operating revenues and operating expenditures of State sector PTEs as a whole were equivalent to about 8.5 per cent and 6.8 per cent of GDP respectively. By comparison, State sector general government own purpose outlays were equivalent to 14 per cent of GDP in 1990-91.

Statement 6 of Budget Paper No 1 provides an overview of the main financial aggregates of both Commonwealth and State/local PTEs, including operating results and cost recovery ratios. This section focuses on the operating performance of State sector PTEs.

State Governments are generally moving to increase the efficiency of their PTEs and some States have also implemented corporatisation and/or privatisation programs that aim to increase the commercial orientation of their PTEs. These programs are intended to produce an improved bottom line performance and, as part of that, to encourage PTEs to operate more commercially.

Table 6 shows for State sector PTEs:

- the operating results (net operating surplus less subsidies and net interest paid);
- subsidies received; and
- cost recovery ratios (ratio of operating revenue, excluding subsidies, to operating expenditure, exclusive and inclusive of net interest outlays).

Although this data masks some very significant differences among the States, it is notable that:

- although operating revenue exceeds operating expenditure, when net interest
 payments and subsidies are taken into account the State sector PTEs as a whole
 continue to operate at a substantial loss. There has, however, been a steady
 improvement across all major categories of PTEs; and
- while the performance of PTEs within a State varies considerably, in aggregate terms the Victorian PTEs are the largest contributors to the sector's loss.

The continuing high level of subsidies may indicate, in some cases, the effects of government policies in restraining pricing of services for broad social reasons. In other cases, the subsidies may be more indicative of under-performance. Some State Governments are beginning to make explicit payments to PTEs for community service obligations (CSOs) imposed upon them by Government. Such moves to greater transparency in the cost of CSOs will facilitate judgments about the performance of PTEs.

The cost recovery ratios, inclusive of net interest outlays, show the extent to which PTEs are able to cover both operating costs and debt servicing obligations. These cost recovery ratios must be treated with considerable caution as they provide only a partial indication of the financial performance of PTEs for various reasons including:

- a high rate of cost recovery may reflect the extent of PTEs' monopoly power rather than the level of efficiency; and
- levels of cost recovery may be affected by requirements to perform unfunded CSOs that often involve the provision of subsidised/unprofitable services.

Nevertheless, the figures suggest that:

- over the past decade, State PTEs in aggregate have covered their operating costs but have covered only around 92 per cent of their total costs, including interest obligations that is, in aggregate they have not earned enough from their own operations to service their debts. However, the situation is improving with around 97 per cent of their total costs being recovered in 1990-91;
- much of this improvement dates from the middle 1980s as the reform programs initiated by the States have taken effect; and
- transport enterprises (particularly railway operations) generally achieve very low levels of cost recovery — reflecting to some extent their CSOs — while electricity authorities achieve much higher levels of cost recovery.

Net Debt and Net Interest Payments

The level of public indebtedness has assumed significance in both domestic and international financial markets. Analyses of the States' overall economic positions and assessments of creditworthiness now turn heavily on assessments of current and prospective debt levels and debt servicing capacities. At the same time, reduced State fiscal flexibility as a result of increasing public debt servicing burdens has provided a focus for State financial adjustment efforts in recent years.

ABS data on State sector net debt and net interest outlays are only available for the period since 30 June 1988².

- Circumstances differ significantly between the States and Territories, with
 Queensland's debt burden relatively minor while Victoria, Tasmania and South
 Australia are confronted by significant debt problems. The net indebtedness of
 the State sector as a whole as of 30 June 1990 is estimated to constitute some
 18 per cent of GDP. This reflects a modest reduction over the previous four
 years but still represents a significant constraint on States' fiscal options.
 - The general government sector accounts for 37 per cent of total net debt.
- The implications for States' budgetary flexibility are evident in the significant and increasing share of total State revenue required to service this debt. Debt servicing costs (net interest outlays as a percentage of total revenue) for the sector as a whole have increased from 13 per cent of total revenue in 1987-88 to 14 per cent in 1991-92. This compares with debt servicing costs of around 5 per cent for the Commonwealth.

OUTLOOK

The financial outlook for 1992-93 for the State/local sector remains constrained.

- Growth in own source revenue is likely to continue to be subdued notwithstanding the recent announcement by a number of States of significant packages of new revenue measures.
- Ongoing public sector restructuring programs are expected to continue to
 contribute to pressures on current outlays, but States should also reap the longer
 term benefits of these initiatives in terms of increased public sector efficiency and
 lower costs.
- The increase in the level of debt associated with the financial problems of some State financial and commercial institutions (for example, the State Bank of South Australia, the Tricontinental Group in Victoria, the Rural and Industries Bank in Western Australia and the Yulara Resort in the Northern Territory) has

significantly increased the debt servicing burden in some States and will be a continuing constraint on budgetary flexibility for some time.

- Some States have initiated sales of business assets (such as the New South Wales Government Insurance Office) which will partially offset expenditures and can help to relieve budgetary pressures.
- States will also benefit from increased net Commonwealth payments as a result of
 agreements reached at the 1992 Premiers' Conference and specific Commonwealth
 initiatives (including those announced in the *One Nation Statement*) to stimulate
 economic activity. Total net payments to the States are expected to grow by
 8.3 per cent in 1992-93 (adjusting for the effect of the 1990 agreement for the
 States to assume full responsibility for refinancing debt previously raised on their
 behalf by the Commonwealth).

All this serves to emphasise the need for States to persevere with their medium term fiscal adjustment efforts.

Estimates of the underlying trends in the State sector's net borrowing requirement need to take account of the impact of the new debt redemption arrangements, which significantly increase State payments to the Commonwealth; and one-off factors such as the sale of major assets and the costs of rescuing State owned financial institutions. While the actual net borrowing requirement for the State/local sector for 1992-93 is expected to be substantially lower than that for 1991-92, this largely reflects one-off factors of the kinds outlined above, which have both increased outlays in 1991-92 and are expected to result in a significant increase in asset sales proceeds in 1992-93. In underlying terms, the sector's net borrowing requirement is expected to deteriorate as revenue growth falls short of the underlying growth in outlays.

NOTES

TEXT

1

A distinction is often made between general government activities and total State/local sector activities that cover both general government and public trading enterprises (PTEs). General government sector functions cover the provision of non-market services and the transfer of income for various public policy purposes. These functions are financed primarily from taxation revenues, with services generally provided free of direct charge or at a charge well below cost. The PTE sector consists of government owned enterprises that provide goods and services for sale in the market with the aim of recovering at least a significant proportion of their operating costs through charges. State/local sector PTEs cover, inter alia, the electricity and public transport systems.

The distinction between general government and PTEs can be important for policy purposes. To the extent that PTEs operate on a fully commercial basis, the PTE sector borrowing requirement should not be of concern from a fiscal policy perspective. Fully commercial PTEs should compete for the nation's resources on the same basis as private firms and be subject to the same economic and policy environment as are private firms. In practice, however, many PTEs are a long way short of being fully commercial in their operations. Furthermore, by virtue of their public ownership, most PTEs are not subject to the same financial and other market scrutiny as are private firms.

In essence, the PTE sector as a whole can be significantly influenced by non-market considerations but in turn their spending and revenue decisions can impact substantially on the economy. They are, therefore, important for not only broader public sector policy but also for fiscal policy.

Net debt is defined as gross debt less financial assets (including investments, cash and deposits and advances or loans made). The concept excludes non-financial assets (land, buildings, plant and equipment etc) and certain liabilities such as employee related liabilities. Contingent liabilities are also excluded.

CHAPTER III: GENERAL PURPOSE ASSISTANCE

This chapter outlines the arrangements for payment of general revenue and general purpose capital assistance to the States and Territories and to local government authorities in 1991-92 and 1992-93 — as well as highlighting a number of issues relating to future arrangements.

Table 7 shows Commonwealth general purpose payments to State and local governments over the past five years.

GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE TO THE STATES AND THE TERRITORIES IN 1991-92 AND 1992-93

General revenue assistance, in one form or another, has been paid by the Commonwealth to the six States since Federation, to the Northern Territory since 1979-80, and to the Australian Capital Territory since 1988-89. It is the major untied element in the Commonwealth's funding to the States. Moreover, as discussed in more detail below, the distribution of general revenue grants is the main method by which the Commonwealth seeks to address imbalances in fiscal capacity between the States and Territories.

General revenue assistance, expected to account for around 46 per cent of total gross Commonwealth payments to the State/local government sectors in 1992-93, comprises four elements.

- The largest component is financial assistance grants paid to the six States and the Northern Territory.
- General revenue grants to the Australian Capital Territory are analogous to the financial assistance grants made to the six States and the Northern Territory. It is intended that funding for the Australian Capital Territory from 1993-94 will be included in the pool of financial assistance grants.
- Special revenue assistance is provided either on account of special financial circumstances or on an interim basis to fund the transfer of certain Commonwealth

programs and/or State revenue capacities. Such assistance can either be funded from the pool of financial assistance grants, and paid for by the States and Northern Territory in proportion to their share of the pool, or involve additional payments by the Commonwealth.

• **Identified road funding** encompasses that portion of local road funding (untied from 1991-92) which relates to expenditure responsibilities of State Governments.

DERIVATION OF LEVEL AND DISTRIBUTION OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS

Level of Financial Assistance Grants

The level of financial assistance grants is determined each year at the Premiers' Conference. In this regard, 1991-92 was the first year of the three year real terms guarantee, agreed to by the Commonwealth in 1990, in recognition of the States' desire for increased financial stability.

The final amount paid to the six States and the Northern Territory in 1991-92 (\$13215m) was lower by \$166.2m than that agreed at the 1991 Premiers' Conference, reflecting the lower CPI outcome for the four quarters to March 1992, of 1.7 per cent, than the original forecast of 3.7 per cent.

The Commonwealth's financial offer to the States and Northern Territory at the June 1992 Premiers' Conference included a 'one-off' \$166m beyond the base level of funding consistent with the real terms guarantee for 1992-93. As part of agreements

reached regarding a compromise distribution of financial assistance grants (discussed below), the Commonwealth agreed to increase its initial offer of an extra \$150m by an estimated \$16m in order to fund higher *per capita* payments to New South Wales and Victoria. It was agreed, however, that the additional \$166m would not be reflected in the base level of funding for 1993-94 and beyond.

It was further agreed that the base level of 1992-93 financial assistance grants be reduced by \$40m to fund special revenue assistance to the Northern Territory (see below).

In accordance with established practice, the estimated level of financial assistance grants for the States and Northern Territory of \$13586m in 1992-93 (including the one-off augmentation of \$166m) will be adjusted to reflect differences between the CPI outcome over the year to the March quarter 1993, and the forecast at the time of the Premiers' Conference.

Distribution of Financial Assistance Grants

The interstate distribution of financial assistance grants has, in recent years, reflected the consensus among the States and Territories that it should be based primarily on the States' shares of population as at 31 December of each year, and the *per capital* relativities assessed by the Commonwealth Grants Commission. (A brief discussion of the Grants Commission processes, and relevant recent developments, is contained in Box 4.) The distribution is also affected by the distribution of hospital funding grants, any program transfer payments and by other adjustments to grants¹.

In 1991-92, the distribution of grants reflected the *per capita* relativities recommended by the Grants Commission in its 1991 Update Report, special revenue assistance for the Northern Territory funded from the pool, and other minor shifts in funding responsibilities between the Commonwealth and the States.

Prior to the 1992 Premiers' Conference, the Commonwealth asked the States to seek agreement on the appropriate distribution of the 1992-93 financial assistance grants. However, they were unable to reach agreement and, by way of compromise, it was decided that the base level of financial assistance grants will be distributed on the basis of the general revenue grant relativities recommended by the Grants Commission and amended to reflect an alternative treatment of the Commission's assessment of State stamp duty capacity (see below) — while the States will receive the higher of their share of the additional \$150m offered by the Commonwealth based on either the use of the Commission's 1992-93 relativities or an equal per capita distribution. These arrangements for distribution are for 1992-93 only — as discussed in Box 4 arrangements for 1993-94 are subject to review and subsequent consideration by the 1993 Premiers' Conference. The interstate allocation of general revenue assistance involves a substantial redistribution or 'equalisation' of national public sector resources in favour of the less populous States. In Table 9, the distribution of financial assistance

grants on the basis of equal *per capita* and Grants Commission relativities are compared. It can be seen that New South Wales and Victoria obtain significantly less under the Grants Commission relativities than they would from an equal *per capita* distribution.

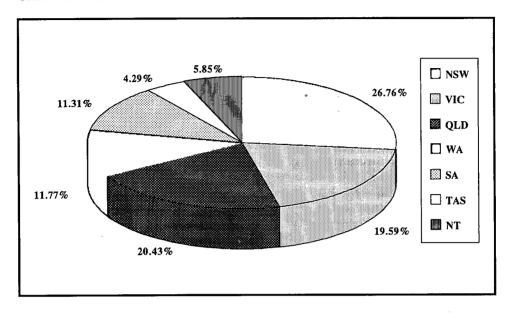
For 1992-93 the Grants Commission presented two sets of relativities: one based upon terms of reference provided in November 1991 and the other based upon terms of reference provided in March 1992. The latter requested the Commission to calculate an alternative set of *per capita* relativities which took account of Victoria's expected loss of revenue capacity following the Commonwealth's decision not to share Petroleum Resource Rent Tax (PRRT) revenue with the States. This implied a significant revenue loss for Victoria.

The additional set of *per capita* relativities allowed an assessment to be made of the likely impact on the distribution of financial assistance grants of this revenue loss to Victoria. In the event, the Commonwealth decided to compensate Victoria directly *via* special revenue assistance in 1992-93 (see below), with this funding to be rolled into financial assistance grants in 1993-94. Therefore, the relativities based on the November terms of reference were used as the basis for discussions at the 1992 Premiers' Conference.

As noted above, these relativities were amended in line with an alternative treatment of stamp duty on marketable securities and conveyancing forgone by the States in the case of corporate reorganisations. This reflected the Commonwealth's view that the Commission's present methodology involves a disincentive for States to facilitate *bona fide* corporate reconstructions that would enhance economic efficiency. The Commonwealth has indicated that it is prepared to instruct the Commission to adjust its methodology accordingly for future assessments.

Chart 9 illustrates the expected distribution of the estimated amount of grants to be paid in 1992-93.

SPECIAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE FOR THE NORTHERN TERRITORY AND VICTORIA

The Northern Territory has received special revenue assistance, funded from the pool of financial assistance grants, each year since its inclusion in the pool in 1988-89. Provision of such assistance reflects a recognition of the special difficulties faced by the Territory as it seeks to adjust to State-like levels of funding. The annual level of special revenue assistance reflects judgments regarding the sustainable pace of fiscal adjustment for the Territory — the level of this special revenue assistance has been progressively reduced over time.

The 1992 Premiers' Conference agreed that the Northern Territory will receive special revenue assistance of \$40m in 1992-93; the same nominal level agreed for 1991-92. Without this assistance, general revenue assistance to the Northern Territory, including the Territory's share of the additional \$166m, would only have risen by 1.1 per cent.

As noted above, Victoria is to receive special revenue assistance of \$139m in 1992-93, as compensation for the Commonwealth's decision to retain Bass Strait PRRT revenues.

BOX 4 — HORIZONTAL FISCAL EQUALISATION AND THE DISTRIBUTION OF GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE

Australia's horizontal fiscal equalisation arrangements, which have operated in their present form since 1981, extend the concept of fiscal equalisation considerably further than in most other federations. In particular, the Australian approach incorporates assessments of States' relative expenditure disabilities as well as revenue raising capacities. (The 1991-92 Budget Paper No 4 includes a detailed discussion of these processes.)

The Commonwealth Grants Commission is charged with recommending *per capita* relativities for the interstate allocation of Commonwealth general revenue assistance so that each State has the capacity to provide an average level of services, without being required to levy above average taxes and charges. The focus on State budget capacity, rather than performance, requires the Commission to take account of non policy related disabilities only.

In light of increasing concern regarding the implications of these processes, and the appropriateness of the Commission's methodology, the 1992 Premiers' Conference agreed that a Heads of Treasury working party should examine the adequacy of the current fiscal equalisation scope and methodology and the principles upon which they are based. That review will focus on the complexity and appropriateness of the current processes; the possible efficiency costs of horizontal fiscal equalisation in the context of current industry reform and tariff reductions; and the possible implications for facilitating structural change throughout Australia. The review will make recommendations as appropriate on these issues.

Two further studies, by independent consultants, have been commissioned by the New South Wales and Victorian Governments. The first study, a qualitative review, will examine the economic and social impacts of the current equalisation arrangements on both individual States and Territories and the nation as a whole. The other study will be a quantitative analysis of the current horizontal fiscal equalisation arrangements on efficiency, economic activity and prices and incomes.

The intention is that these studies, together with the Heads of Treasury review and the Grants Commission's five yearly methodology review, will be available for consideration by the 1993 Premiers' Conference.

The Commonwealth indicated that, if decisions taken following these reviews disadvantaged States or Territories compared with Grants Commission relativities for 1993-94, it would stand ready to provide transitional compensation to those States and Territories, at least over the period 1993-94 to 1995-96.

This payment, which is based on the average level of offshore petroleum royalty and resource rent tax revenue sharing payments to Victoria over recent years, is to be financed by the Commonwealth and absorbed into the financial assistance grants base for 1993-94.

Special revenue assistance will be adjusted for the difference between the CPI as forecast at the time of the Premiers' Conference and the outcome.

IDENTIFIED ROAD GRANTS

Following agreements reached at the October 1990 special Premiers' Conference, funding for **local roads** was untied with effect from 1991-92 and paid *via* general purpose grants.

The bulk of this local roads funding is paid through States to local governments (see below) and a portion is paid directly to the States for local road expenditures in areas not covered by local government. All these funds continue to be identified as road grants but are now not subject to any formal conditions requiring them to be spent for that purpose.

In 1991-92, \$39m was paid direct to State Governments for local roads and the comparable estimate for 1992-93 is \$31m. (This reflects, *inter alia*, a decision to increase the level of identified local roads funding paid to local government bodies in Tasmania and the Northern Territory by some \$10m, with an offsetting reduction in the amounts paid direct to those State governments for local roads.)

In relation to the separate category of funds for arterial roads, it was agreed at the July 1991 special Premiers' Conference and reaffirmed in the Commonwealth's *One Nation Statement* that the Commonwealth would untie \$350m of these road grants previously provided to States as a specific purpose payment funded from the Australian Land Transport Fund. As in the case of local roads, these funds will continue to be identified as road grants but will not be subject to any formal conditions. The Commonwealth has indicated that funds for arterial roads will be untied from the second half of 1993-94 and progressively phased to an interstate distribution based on the financial assistance grants relativities by 1997-98.

GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE TO THE AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY

Following self-government in 1988, transitional funding arrangements were agreed with the Australian Capital Territory with a view to including funding for the Territory within the pool of financial assistance grants for the States and the Northern Territory from 1993-94.

Nonetheless, Grants Commission inquiries in 1988 and 1991 on financing the Australian Capital Territory identified significant over-funding of the Australian Capital Territory relative to the other States. This implied the need for the Territory to accommodate reductions in the level of Commonwealth assistance so that funding arrangements could be placed on a State-like basis in 1993-94.

The 1991 Premiers' Conference agreed that the level of general revenue assistance for 1991-92 should be based upon:

- the per capita relativity assessed by the Grants Commission following its Fourth Report 1991 on Financing the Australian Capital Territory; and
- augmented by the balance in the Australian Capital Territory Transitional Funding Trust Account.

Subsequently, the 1992 Premiers' Conference determined that the level of general revenue assistance for the Australian Capital Territory in 1992-93 should be based upon the *per capita* relativity assessed by the Grants Commission on the same basis as that used in respect of the other States. On that basis, the Australian Capital Territory will receive a **general revenue grant** of \$375m in 1992-93, with an additional \$3.7m as a result of the one-off augmentation of the pool of financial assistance grants for the six States and the Northern Territory. As for the States and Northern Territory, the final amount paid will be adjusted for the difference between the CPI forecast at the time of the Premiers' Conference and the outcome.

Special revenue assistance of \$15m will also be paid to the Territory in 1992-93 on the understanding that this will be used to support public sector restructuring initiatives aimed at assisting the Territory's adjustment efforts. Any further special revenue assistance for the Australian Capital Territory from 1993-94 (when it is to be included in the pool of financial assistance grants) is to be funded from the pool.

More detailed descriptions of the derivation and distribution of general revenue grants to the State and the Territory Governments are provided at the end of this chapter.

GENERAL PURPOSE CAPITAL ASSISTANCE

General purpose capital assistance is paid to assist States in their capital expenditure.

Chart 10 illustrates the distribution of estimated 1992-93 general purpose capital payments while Table 10 shows the history of these payments since 1987-88.

CHART 10: DISTRIBUTION OF GENERAL PURPOSE CAPITAL GRANTS 1992-93

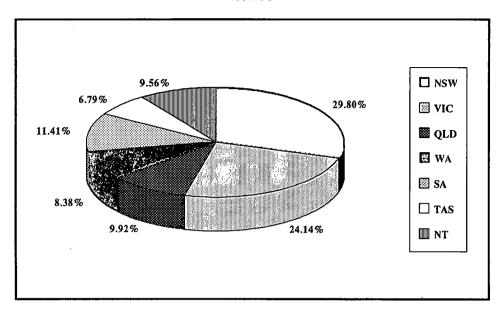

Prior to 1987-88, capital assistance was paid under States' Loan Council programs in the form of loans. However, the importance of loans declined steadily from the early 1970s because:

the overall level of general purpose capital assistance fell, with States financing an
increasing proportion of their capital works from other sources — including other
payments from the Commonwealth and borrowings by State authorities not within
the State budget sector; and

• an increasing proportion of general purpose capital assistance was provided in concessional form as grants or as loans for public housing.

General purpose capital assistance has been provided entirely by way of grants since 1989-90 and the base level of capital grants provided under States' Loan Council programs — and the analogous payments to the Territories — has remained unchanged in nominal terms through this period. (Chapter IV of 1991-92 Budget Paper No 4 details recent developments in general purpose capital assistance.)

For 1992-93, the level of general purpose capital assistance provided with regard to States' Loan Council programs will again remain unchanged in nominal terms.

By and large, the distribution of these grants among the six States reflects their historical shares (broadly unchanged since 1927-28) of the Loan Council borrowing programs which they have progressively replaced. The level of analogous payments made to the two Territories reflects the Commonwealth capital expenditure responsibilities transferred to each at self-government. As a result, general purpose capital assistance represents a larger share of Commonwealth payments to the Territories than is the case for the six States. For example, for 1992-93 general purpose capital assistance is estimated to comprise around 5.1 per cent of total general purpose assistance to the Northern Territory and 8.6 per cent for the Australian Capital Territory compared with an average of 3.2 per cent for the six States.

An additional \$182m in general purpose capital grants will be provided to the States and the Territories in 1992-93 under the second year of the 'Building Better Cities' program. As in 1991-92, the distribution of this grant will be determined on the basis of an assessment of States' relative needs following consultations with the States.

GENERAL PURPOSE ASSISTANCE FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT

SIX STATES AND NORTHERN TERRITORY

General purpose assistance has been paid to local government authorities since 1974-75. Arrangements since 1986-87 have been embodied in the *Local Government* (Financial Assistance) Act 1986 with the Northern Territory included with the States under the Act.

In June 1991, the Act was amended to enable the Government to avoid frequent changes to the Act as a result of changes in State funding arrangements determined annually at the Premiers' Conference.

In addition, changes were made to the Act in respect of the October 1990 special Premiers' Conference agreement to until local roads funding. These amendments provide for local roads funding previously paid under the Australian Land Transport

Development Act 1988 to be added to local government general purpose grants. While the local roads funding will continue to be separately identified for the time being, there are no longer any conditions applying to these roads grants.

Local government financial assistance grants are escalated each year at the same rate as general revenue payments to the States.

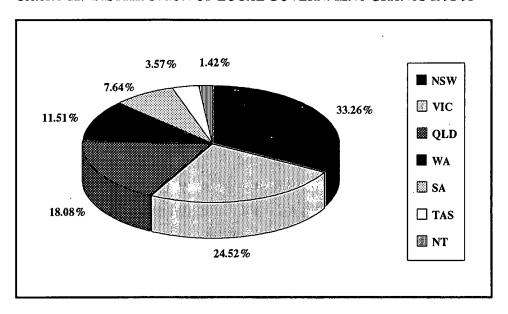
In 1991-92, the total amount of general purpose payments paid to local government was \$1017.1m, some \$7.8m below the budget time estimate of local government general revenue payments — reflecting the difference between the budget time estimate and the outcome of the CPI for the year to the March quarter.

On the basis of present estimates, general purpose assistance to local government in 1992-93 will be \$1056m. This comprises:

- a base grant of \$735m a nominal increase of 2.9 per cent on the 1991-92 level;
 and
- an additional \$321m relating to previously tied road funding an increase of 5.9 per cent.

In accordance with the Local Government (Financial Assistance) Act 1986, the interstate distribution of base general purpose assistance to local government moved fully to equal per capita shares from 1989-90, based on the population at the previous 31 December. Changes in the distribution of the base grant between 1991-92 and 1992-93 reflect different population growth rates among the States over the year to 31 December 1991. Untied local roads funding continues to be distributed between the States on the basis of the criteria established under the Australian Land Transport Development Act 1988. In both cases, the intrastate distribution of these payments to local governments is determined by State Grants Commissions, on the basis of fiscal equalisation. The chart below illustrates the distribution of local government grants between the six States and the Northern Territory.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT GRANTS TO THE AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY

The Australian Capital Territory Government has responsibility for both territorial and municipal functions and, since 1988-89, has received Commonwealth payments in respect of general purpose assistance for local government functions — analogous to those paid to local governments through the States.

In 1991-92, the amount paid was \$12.2m (based on the equal *per capita* sharing arrangements for the States) and an additional amount of \$10.3m relating to previously tied local government roads funding. For 1992-93, the total amount to be paid to the ACT is estimated to be \$23m, of which a little under \$11m is untied local government roads funding.

Table 11 details the distribution of local government grants between all States and Territories.

DISTRIBUTION OF FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE GRANTS

The distribution of financial assistance grants is based primarily on States' shares of population as at 31 December of each year and the *per capita* relativities assessed by the Commonwealth Grants Commission. It is also affected by the distribution of Hospital Funding grants (HFGs) and any program transfer payments¹.

Table 13 details how financial assistance grants are distributed between the States and the Territories.

General Revenue Grant Relativities

The Grants Commission's assessments of *per capita* relativities are determined against principles of fiscal equalisation. In essence, this involves the Commission determining a distribution which enables each State, provided a comparable revenue effort is made, to deliver services at a standard not appreciably different from that of the other States.

Population

The final distribution of financial assistance grants among the States will be affected by the Commonwealth Statistician's determination of each States' population as at 31 December of each year. In calculating the financial assistance grants payable to each State, the Commission's per capita relativities are multiplied by the population of each State to give adjusted populations (rows 3 and 13 of Table 13). Each State's share of the sum of the adjusted populations then determines their respective shares of the combined financial assistance and hospital grants pool (see rows 1 to 5 and 11 to 15) before adjustments.

In estimating payments for 1992-93, population projections for 31 December 1992 were prepared in consultation with the ABS.

Hospital Funding Grants

The Grants Commission's relativities have been prepared in recent years on the understanding that they are to be applied to the combined pool of financial assistance and HFGs. In 1992-93, a State's share of financial assistance grants is derived as the difference between:

- its share of financial assistance and HFGs excluding the 'quarantined payments'—
 comprising the penalties and incentive packages and funding for AIDS (row 15);
 and
- its share of HFGs, excluding the quarantined payments, which is calculated in accordance with age-sex weighted populations (shown in row 16).

Other Adjustments to Financial Assistance Grants

Adjustments are made to financial assistance grants when there are transfers of functions or revenue raising capacity between the Commonwealth and the State sectors. In 1992-93, there are two such adjustments: the transfer of funding responsibility for the Victorian College of Agriculture and Horticulture (VCAH) from Victoria to the Commonwealth and the recoupment of grants following the non transfer to Victoria of the Moira Nursing Home.

As part of a wider rationalisation of facilities, the VCAH has been amalgamated with the University of Melbourne. The revised arrangements involve the inclusion of funding for the College in the *Higher Education Funding Act 1988* with appropriate adjustments to financial assistance grants. The total adjustment to financial assistance grants will be \$4.856m spread over two years. A special provision was made under the *States Grants (General Purposes) Act 1991* that reduced the Victorian 1991-92 grant by \$2.428m. A further adjustment of \$2.428m will be made before the application of the CPI adjustment for 1992-93. It is understood that the Grants Commission has taken into account these revised arrangements in the relativities for 1992-93 and beyond.

In 1990-91, there were proposals made for the transfer of responsibilities under the Disabilities Services Program. Although most of the proposals were accepted, the proposal with regard to Moira Nursing Home in Victoria was not accepted. This decision was made too late to reverse the addition of \$0.2m to the base of financial assistance grants in 1991-92 in the *States Grants (General Purposes) Act 1991*. While no corrective action was made to the pool with respect of 1991-92 payments, adjustments will be made to the base for 1992-93.

EFFECTS OF POPULATION AND RELATIVITIES ON THE DISTRIBUTION OF GRANTS

Table 14 details the effects of the two major influences — population and relativities — on the distribution of financial assistance grants in 1992-93. The table takes into account special revenue payments made to the Northern Territory in 1991-92 and 1992-93 and to Victoria in 1992-93.

GENERAL REVENUE ASSISTANCE TO THE AUSTRALIAN CAPITAL TERRITORY

Tables 15 and 16 show the derivation of the Australian Capital Territory general revenue payments for 1991-92 and estimated payments for 1992-93, respectively. Payments in 1991-92 were based upon:

- the per capita relativity assessed by the Commonwealth Grants Commission following its Fourth Report 1991 on Financing the Australian Capital Territory; and
- the accumulated balance in the Australian Capital Territory Transitional Funding Trust Account.

For 1992-93, the Grants Commission assessed a per capita relativity for the Australian Capital Territory in conjunction with its annual assessments of the States and the Northern Territory. As with previous years, this relativity is used to calculate the Territory's grant with respect to the reference Victorian per capita grant calculated using the Grants Commission relativities for both the base financial grants and the additional \$150m offered by the Commonwealth. Further, special revenue assistance of some \$15m will be paid to the Australian Capital Territory in 1992-93. These arrangements are consistent with the Territory's transition to State-like levels of funding in advance of its inclusion in the pool of financial assistance grants for the States and Northern Territory from 1993-94.

CHAPTER IV: BORROWINGS BY THE STATE/LOCAL SECTOR

This chapter details Loan Council arrangements applying to the determination of borrowing levels of the State/local sector and for Commonwealth authorities.

The Loan Council (which comprises representatives of the Commonwealth and the six States) was established under the Financial Agreement of 1927. The Financial Agreement allowed the Commonwealth to borrow on behalf of the six States and required them to meet interest and sinking fund contributions on the outstanding debt; sinking fund contributions are used to redeem outstanding debt under the Financial Agreement.

Analogous arrangements apply in respect of the Territories¹. The June 1990 Loan Council meeting agreed that the States and Territories would progressively take over responsibility for debt issued by the Commonwealth on their behalf. Arrangements to implement this decision are outlined in Box 5.

LOAN COUNCIL ARRANGEMENTS APPLYING TO AUTHORITY BORROWINGS

While borrowings by Commonwealth and State Authorities and the Territories are not subject to the Financial Agreement, various arrangements agreed by the Commonwealth and the States since 1936 have provided for Loan Council approval of annual borrowing programs for semi-government and local authorities. As the Financial Agreement prevents the States from borrowing in their own names, State Government borrowing needs are generally met through their central borrowing authorities. In this way, borrowings undertaken on behalf of State Governments come under the purview of Loan Council.

The Gentlemen's Agreement between the Commonwealth and the States provided the framework for Loan Council oversight of borrowings by Commonwealth and State authorities from 1936 to 1984. By the early 1980s, however, Loan Council was exercising increasingly less influence under the Gentlemen's Agreement over total authority borrowings, reflecting growing resort to non-conventional financing techniques outside the scope of the Agreement.

The Gentlemen's Agreement was therefore replaced in 1984 by the Global Approach to authority borrowings. The primary objective in introducing the Global Approach was to broaden the scope of Loan Council oversight of authority borrowings by bringing all forms of borrowings by Commonwealth and State semi-government and local authorities, government owned companies and trusts within voluntarily agreed limits. These limits apply to the amount of net new borrowings incurred over the course of the year. They do not address existing debt levels.

BOX 5— REDEMPTION OF STATE DEBT

The June 1990 Loan Council meeting agreed that the States would progressively take over responsibility for debt issued by the Commonwealth on their behalf under the Financial Agreement, and that the Financial Agreement would be amended to permit the States to borrow in their own names in the domestic market. Analogous arrangements were to apply for the Territories.

In line with this decision, the States are required to make additional payments to the National Debt Sinking Fund sufficient to permit redemption at their maturity of all Commonwealth Government securities issued on their behalf. A total of \$13.6 billion of Commonwealth Government securities was on issue on behalf of the States and Territories as at 30 June 1992. Under the new arrangement this debt will be fully taken over by the States and Territories by 2005-06. The Loan Council decision has also meant that from 30 June 1990 there have been no additional allocations of Commonwealth Government securities to the States and Territories.

In 1992-93, additional payments of \$2397m are to be made to the Commonwealth by the States and the Northern Territory which, together with their standard payments required under the Financial and related Agreements, Commonwealth sinking fund contributions on their behalf and interest on sinking fund balances, will provide for the redemption of \$2549.5m in debt.

The Commonwealth compensates the States and Territories for the additional borrowing cost to them of this change based on the interest margins between Commonwealth and State debt applying at, and prior to, the change. (State central borrowing authorities, which are the major borrowers on behalf of the State/local sector, generally borrow at somewhat higher rates than the Commonwealth Government, with margins varying from time to time depending on market conditions.) In addition, the Commonwealth provides compensation for its reduced sinking fund contributions due to the accelerated decline in outstanding net debt on which those contributions are based. Under these debt redemption arrangements the States and Territories were paid \$212m in compensation in 1991-92. In 1992-93, compensation payable is estimated to be \$123m.

Overall, these new arrangements replace Commonwealth debt to the private sector with State and Territory debt; they do not alter the financial position of the public sector as a whole. They do, however, represent a significant structural reform in Commonwealth/State (and Territory) financial relations. They place full responsibility on the States and Territories for the financing and managing of their own debt, thereby subjecting the fiscal and debt management strategies of individual State and Territory Governments to greater scrutiny by the community and financial markets.

The objective of the Global Approach has been to influence directly the public sector's call on domestic and foreign savings.

'Borrowings' under the Global Approach are defined broadly to include the whole range of financing arrangements available to authorities, including conventional borrowings, financial leases and related instruments, and equity financing by, or on behalf of, authorities. The coverage of the Global Approach corresponds in most respects with that of the Public Sector Borrowing Requirement (PSBR) described in Statement 6 of Budget Paper No 1.

The Global Approach covers all borrowings falling within the gross PSBR other than borrowings by statutory marketing authorities, public financial enterprises, and borrowings by the Commonwealth Government covered by the Financial Agreement². Further detail on the Global Approach is provided in Box 6.

RECENT AMENDMENTS TO THE GLOBAL APPROACH

The most recent two Loan Council meetings have agreed to a number of changes in the operation of the Global Approach. At the May 1991 meeting, Loan Council approved an amendment to the Global Approach resolution to provide scope for Public Trading Enterprises (PTEs) operating in a competitive environment to be exempted from the global limits where they satisfy certain commerciality criteria. In particular:

- enterprises without substantial private equity need to demonstrate an established record of meeting strict commerciality criteria; and
- enterprises with substantial private equity (of the order of 40 per cent or more) need to be constituted to operate in a commercial manner and have at least a demonstrated commitment to operating in a commercial manner, including the achievement of satisfactory performance. Continued exemption from the global limits would require that commitment to be realised in practice.

While only a small number of PTEs are likely at present to qualify for exemption under these criteria, the change provides an incentive for them to operate in a fully commercial manner. If such performance is achieved, exemption from the global limits can be justified on the basis that the enterprise's operations will be more akin to that of private sector enterprises and will not, therefore, require as much public sector oversight to prevent undue or unwarranted demands on economic resources.

The decision to introduce the new exemption criteria was outlined in greater detail in the 1991-92 Budget Paper Ne 4. The detailed requirements for exemption on commerciality grounds are also outlined in the 1991 Commonwealth/State Officers' Report to Loan Council, *Coverage of the Global Approach*. Copies of this Report are available from the Loan Council Secretariat in Commonwealth Treasury.

BOX 6— THE GLOBAL APPROACH

The central feature of the Global Approach is the application of aggregate quantitative controls or 'global limits' on borrowings by Commonwealth and State authorities. Under the Global Approach it is agreed that:

- the Commonwealth and each State Government will voluntarily limit the level
 of new money borrowings by their authorities each year from all specified
 sources to global limits agreed by Loan Council. As occurred under the
 Gentlemen's Agreement, each State and the Commonwealth is free to determine
 the distribution of the total among its individual authorities;
- authorities subject to the limits include semi-government and local authorities
 and all companies and trusts which, whether wholly, majority or partly owned,
 are effectively controlled by the relevant governments. Borrowings by
 government owned financial institutions (such as State banks and insurance
 companies) and statutory marketing authorities are excluded from the global
 limits except when on-lent to, or used by, governments or authorities subject to
 the limits;
- new money borrowings within the agreed limits include 'conventional' domestic and overseas loan raisings, deferred payment arrangements, overseas trade credits, financial leases (including leveraged leasing and similar arrangements), sale and lease back arrangements, instalment purchase by government departments, the net change in temporary purpose borrowings over the financial year and any other form of raising new capital funds (including equity raisings by or on behalf of authorities). New money borrowings exclude temporary purpose borrowings within the financial year and operating leases, although the latter are to be included under the global limits from 1993-94; and
- bodies subject to global limits are able to refinance maturing debt outside new money borrowing limits, provided there is no net addition to the total level of outstanding debt.

A Guide to the Global Limits was endorsed at the May 1991 Loan Council meeting and is currently being updated to reflect the decisions taken by Loan Council at its June 1992 meeting. This paper sets out guidelines for the interpretation of the Global Approach resolution as it applies to new types of financing arrangements and for the exchange of information on such arrangements between members. Copies of the Guide to the Global Limits are available on request from the Loan Council Secretariat in the Commonwealth Treasury.

Commonwealth/State Officers' Reports

The June 1992 Loan Council meeting also endorsed a number of Commonwealth/State Officers' Reports proposing adjustments and refinements to the Global Approach resolution. The key initiatives flowing from these reports are outlined below.

Operating Leases

Loan Council agreed to the recommendation in the Officers' Report to include operating leases under the Global Approach beginning in 1993-94. This change should remove uncertainties in the classification of particular financing transactions and minimise the potential for anomalies in the administration of the global limits. Placing operating leases on the same footing as other transactions, including finance leases, also removes a possible distortion in the way the alternative methods of financing are assessed. In addition, the resultant broader coverage of the global limits will enable a better assessment of public sector calls on financial markets. The aggregate level of global limits is to be adjusted upwards to reflect the inclusion of operating leases in the base.

Treatment of Overseas Subsidiaries

The expansion of a number of PTEs into overseas markets drew attention to the question of whether borrowings by overseas subsidiaries of entities within the Global Approach should be exempted from the global limits. In response to the Officers' Report, Loan Council agreed to exclude overseas subsidiaries of entities within the Global Approach from the global limits, where they: operate solely outside Australia; at arm's length to the parent entity; and do not channel funds raised back to the parent.

Overseas Queuing Arrangements and Information Requirements

Under the Global Approach resolution, Loan Council approval was required to approach permitted international public issue markets, subject to the Commonwealth having priority and to orderly queuing arrangements. Against the background of the significant growth in the absorption capacity of international markets since the introduction of the Global Approach, Loan Council's decision to abolish the queuing arrangements reflected a general consensus that they had outlived their usefulness.

In relation to the information requirements under the Global Approach, Loan Council agreed to the introduction of separate reporting requirements for the borrowing activities of central borrowing authorities (CBAs) and the funds advanced by CBAs to entities within the global limits. In order to reduce the administrative burden of the reporting requirement generally, Loan Council also agreed to move from a monthly to a quarterly reporting period.

Treatment of State Home Finance Schemes

With the evolution in recent years of a number of different schemes for raising and lending funds for home financing, the Officers' Report sought to clarify the treatment of these schemes for Loan Council purposes. In accordance with the revised ABS treatment of home finance schemes which excludes them from the recorded PSBR, Loan Council agreed that State/Territory home finance schemes which operate on a commercial basis be treated as outside the global limits, but that any concessional elements of such schemes be included within the Global Approach.

AMENDMENTS TO THE FINANCIAL AGREEMENT

Loan Council also agreed to proceed with amendments to the Financial Agreement to permit the States to borrow by the issue of securities in their own names in domestic and overseas markets and to make other amendments to simplify its administration. These amendments were:

- to remove the requirement for future Commonwealth and State borrowings to be approved under the provisions of the Financial Agreement;
- to remove references to the National Debt Sinking Fund (NDSF); and
- subject to legal advice from the Attorney General, to include the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory as members of Loan Council and as parties to the Financial Agreement.

These amendments will be effected by complementary Commonwealth/State and Territory legislation.

BORROWINGS BY UNIVERSITIES

The June 1992 Loan Council meeting also agreed in principle that universities should be given greater access to borrowings. This was against the background of concerns about limited access by universities to adequate funds, given that universities now have a greater opportunity to meet educational needs on a user pay basis by expanding their services and facilities.

Following consultations with the States, the Commonwealth will support Loan Council allocation from 1993-94 of additional borrowing limits for each State specifically for its universities. The new arrangements should ensure that States have the capacity to accommodate borrowings by universities within their global limits, and that the Global Approach does not unduly constrain access by universities to adequate funding.

GLOBAL BORROWING LIMITS FOR 1992-93

The June 1992 Loan Council meeting agreed to a 10 per cent increase in the States and Territories' aggregate basic global borrowing limits in 1992-93 to \$4161.4m. This increase comes after three years in which the global borrowing limits for the States and Territories were held constant in nominal terms.

Consistent with the agreement reached at the June 1990 meeting of Loan Council and recent practice, the 1992-93 borrowing limit has been distributed among the States in accordance with the phased introduction of equal *per capita* shares. These adjustments are shown in Table 17 below. The basic global limits for the Territories were set on the same basis.

The global borrowing limits continue to be administered flexibly to take account of year to year variations in States' borrowing needs through the provision of special additions. The October 1990 special Premiers' Conference (SPC) agreed that the transitional funding of microeconomic reforms with large up-front costs and delayed benefits could be accommodated within special additions under the Global Approach.

The following special additions to 1992-93 State and Territory global borrowing limits were agreed at the 12 June 1992 meeting of Loan Council:

- \$365m for New South Wales, comprising \$85m for the Olympic bid and \$280m for public sector redundancies;
- \$50m for Western Australia for infrastructure. Under arrangements agreed at the May 1985 Loan Council meeting, Western Australia was also granted a special addition of \$80.6m in 1992-93 (compared with \$70.6m in 1991-92) to finance abnormal levels of State Electricity Commission (SECWA) gas inventories acquired from the North West Shelf project this amount is provided from within the aggregate basic global limit for State authorities rather than as an addition to aggregate basic global limits; and
- \$35m for the Northern Territory comprising \$30m for the State Square project (\$33m was provided in 1991-92) and \$5m for other building projects.

In addition to the new money borrowing limits agreed for the States and Territories, provision is made for borrowings by State authorities (and, following the necessary amendments to the Financial Agreement, State Governments) to replace debt raised by the Commonwealth on their behalf, which they are to redeem. (See Box 5.) These additional borrowings will not add to the scope for States and Territories to undertake capital expenditure but will replace borrowings undertaken by the Commonwealth on the States' behalf.

Table 18 shows the additional limits necessary for States to refinance Commonwealth advances under the revised arrangements for the redemption of State debt. The borrowing programs for each of the States and the Territories, as well as the Commonwealth, are shown in Table 19.

For 1992-93, Loan Council approved a new money borrowing limit for Commonwealth authorities of \$920m, around \$700m lower than the limit for 1991-92. The 1991-92 borrowing outcome for Commonwealth authorities, however, was lower than expected. A significant amount of the shortfall was due to the sale of AUSSAT to the private sector and the associated redemption of AUSSAT debt. In addition, a number of other Commonwealth authorities borrowed significantly less than their limit.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITY BORROWINGS

As shown in Table 20, local authority borrowings undertaken within the global limits for State and Territory authorities, totalled \$625m in 1991-92 or about 10 per cent of public authority new money borrowings by the States.

The amount of borrowings by local government authorities varies markedly among States (after adjusting for population differences). This reflects a number of factors, including differences in demand for local government infrastructure arising from differing rates of population growth among the States and, more importantly, variations among the States in the functions allocated to local government. The level of these borrowings is ultimately at the discretion of individual State Governments.

CHAPTER V: SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS

This chapter provides details of the level and interstate distribution of specific purpose payments (SPPs) to the States and Territories and discusses a number of related policy issues. (A record of payments, consistent with the presentation in Budget Paper No 1, is provided in Appendices I and II¹.)

THE NATURE AND PURPOSE OF SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS

Along with general purpose assistance, SPPs are made under Section 96 of the Constitution whereby the Parliament may grant financial assistance to any State on such terms and conditions as it sees fit. SPPs are provided to the States for a variety of reasons. They have been used to give effect to Commonwealth and national interests in areas of joint Commonwealth/State responsibility (such as ensuring minimum national standards in the provision of health or education services) and to respond to States' requests for additional funding to meet specific needs.

The majority of SPPs are subject to conditions to ensure that policy objectives set by the Commonwealth, or national policy objectives agreed by the Commonwealth and the States, are met. It is because of these conditions that SPPs are sometimes called 'tied grants'. However, where conditions are imposed on individual SPPs they vary considerably in both degree and form. They may involve:

- a requirement that the payment be expended for a specified purpose, with varying degrees of budgetary discretion available to the States according to:
 - broad Commonwealth/State agreements covering principles and program delivery mechanisms, and/or
 - detailed conditions on the operation of joint expenditure programs including program and, in some cases, project approval, matching arrangements and/or information requirements; or
- general policy requirements on States (for instance, that the States provide free
 public hospital treatment to Medicare patients as a condition of hospital funding
 grants).

Box 7 discusses some issues relating to the provision of 'tied grants'.

BOX 7— 'TIED GRANTS': SOME ISSUES

The role of 'tied grants' and their share of total Commonwealth assistance to the States and Territories have recently been the focus of public debate. In particular, the special Premiers' Conference (SPC) processes initiated in 1990 spent considerable time discussing these issues. Concerns have been expressed that such funding:

- involves a significant erosion of States' budgetary flexibility for example, by limiting the ability of individual States to determine funding priorities in particular areas. (In 1991-92, SPPs accounted for 52 per cent of total Commonwealth payments to the States, and 19 per cent of total State outlays.); and
- clouds the accountability of each level of government for the provision of public sector services.

'Tied grants', however, constitute an important means of giving effect to agreed national policy interests in areas of joint Commonwealth/State responsibility. In this regard, tied grants can be used to satisfy broader community demands for minimum national standards in program areas such as health and education and to ensure the optimal provision of public services by States where there are spillover benefits for other jurisdictions. Those considerations have to be weighed against the concerns listed above.

Within 'tied grants', there are nonetheless ways of providing States with greater flexibility over time in the management of their budgets.

- As public sector performance assessment and accountability increasingly focuses
 on outcomes, rather than inputs (such as funds spent or resources used), there is
 greater scope for efficiency improvement and more innovative means of
 satisfying the Commonwealth's broader policy interests in areas of shared
 responsibility, while maximising States' autonomy and flexibility in responding
 to community needs.
- This could involve the amalgamation of individual SPPs in a particular program
 area into a single 'broadbanded' SPP or 'untying' particular SPPs subject to an
 overarching Commonwealth/State outcome based agreement.

Also there is scope to review classification issues to better reflect the implications of individual payments for States' budgetary flexibility. The introduction in 1991-92 of a sub-classification of SPPs, that is, payments 'to' and 'through' the States, is relevant in this respect.

Those SPPs which are not subject to conditions largely relate to the transfer of revenue collected under various regulatory arrangements. Examples include the payment of compensation to the States for the transfer to the Commonwealth of responsibility for companies regulation (\$120.5m in 1992-93), grants to Western Australia and the Northern Territory in lieu of royalties (\$19.6m) and the sharing of proceeds from criminal asset recovery (\$0.3m).

THE LEVEL AND DISTRIBUTION OF SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS

Table 21 summarises both general purpose and specific purpose payments to the States on the basis of the functional classifications used in Budget Paper No 1.

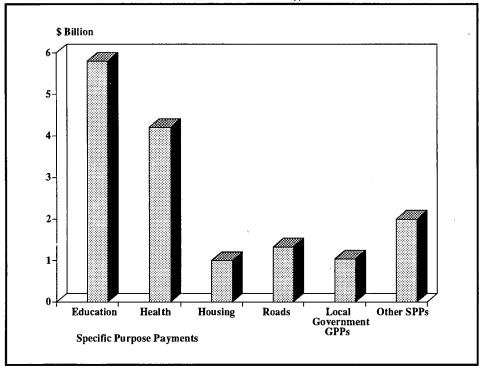

Recent Trends in the Level and Composition of SPPs

In 1992-93, SPPs are estimated to total approximately \$17.6 billion or 54 per cent of Commonwealth payments to the States and Territories. Payments to (as opposed to through) the States are expected to total \$11.2 billion. (Box 8 discusses the classification of SPPs.) A limited number of programs account for the bulk of this assistance. In 1992-93, payments for education, health, housing, roads and financial assistance to local government are around 86 per cent of estimated total SPPs. Of the \$2.1 billion increase in 1992-93 SPPs, a significant proportion reflects the employment and infrastructure programs announced in *One Nation*, in the *Youth Statement* and in this Budget.

Chart 12 highlights the contribution of major specific purpose programs to the total level of payments in 1991-92. Chart 13 provides details of trends in SPPs as a proportion of total Commonwealth payments to the States since 1970-71, including trends in payments 'to' and 'through' the States.

BOX 8— CLASSIFICATION OF SPECIFIC PURPOSE PAYMENTS

Two forms of classification are used for SPPs.

- Classification by function. This distinguishes between SPPs on the basis of the primary function for which the funds are to be used (for example, health or education). The discussion of individual payments in this chapter, together with the material contained in Appendices I and II, is based on the functional classification used in Budget Paper No 1. Some specific purpose programs are not earmarked for a particular function or encompass more than one functional category and are therefore included in the 'Not Allocated to Function' category. The classification of a payment to a particular function need not imply that the payment is 'tied' in terms of binding conditions on expenditure of the funds.
- Classification by Economic Type. This refers to the classification of Commonwealth outlays according to their economic impact. Together with general purpose payments, SPPs are classified as transfers to other levels of government.

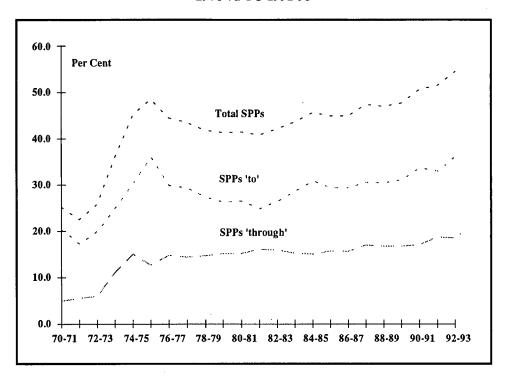
Of the latter classification, the two aspects of most relevance to this Budget Paper are the division of SPPs into grants and advances (loans) and their classification into payments either 'to' or 'through' the States.

There has been a general decline in recent years in advances to the States as these programs have been discontinued or replaced by Commonwealth grants.

The categorisation of Commonwealth payments as either 'to' or 'through' the States arose out of concerns originally expressed by the States at the 1990 Premiers' Conference. These payments are classified as either:

- payments to the State Governments payments direct to State and Territory
 Governments, excluding those made for passing on to other bodies and
 individuals; or
- payments through State Governments payments to State and Territory
 Governments for passing on to other bodies and individuals. Examples include
 Higher Education payments, which States have been obliged to pass on to the
 relevant institutions, and local government financial assistance grants which are
 paid through the States. Such payments have no direct impact on States'
 budgetary flexibility.

There was a significant increase in the level of SPPs between 1972-73 and 1975-76, primarily as a result of increased Commonwealth funding for education and health. Subsequently, the share of total Commonwealth payments accounted for by SPPs declined through the latter half of the 1970s before rising steadily through the last decade.

Since the mid-1970s, payments through the States have been a relatively stable proportion of total payments, with most of the variation in the share of total SPPs being accounted for by developments in SPPs to the States.

• SPPs to the States are expected to account for 35 per cent of total gross payments to the States in 1992-93 compared with 26 per cent in 1982-83.

The increasing share of SPPs in total Commonwealth payments in recent years reflects a number of factors, for example:

 the reclassification of existing programs, such as the transfer in 1989-90 of nominated housing advances, provided under States' Loan Council programs, into Commonwealth State Housing Agreement grants;

- significant changes in the structure of Commonwealth hospital funding, in
 particular the absorption of Hospital Cost Sharing grants within general revenue
 assistance in 1981-82 in the form of identified health grants, and the subsequent
 1988 decision to combine States' Medicare Compensation grants (introduced in
 1984) and identified health grants into a single new SPP hospital funding
 grants;
- the growth of many individual specific purpose programs in accordance with various agreed escalation arrangements based, for example, on population growth or price movements at a time when there has been restrained growth of general purpose assistance; and
- for 1992-93, the Commonwealth's emphasis on labour market and employment programs in the context of high unemployment and modest growth.

Changes in Commonwealth policy in relation to major programs have also influenced trends in the total level of SPPs.

- After strong growth through the mid 1970s, the level of payments for housing and sewerage has declined significantly in both absolute and relative terms.
- Similarly, the termination of the Community Employment Program (consisting
 primarily of housing and labour market programs) in 1987-88, together with
 subsequent restraint in housing, road and local government grants, contributed to a
 decline in the level of SPPs in real terms from 1984-85 to 1989-90,
 notwithstanding their increasing share of total Commonwealth payments.

In 1992-93, total SPPs are expected to increase by 10.1 per cent in real terms with growth in SPPs to the States accounting for 6.4 percentage points of the real increase. This largely reflects the impact of additional outlays resulting from Commonwealth policy initiatives with regard to education, including significant growth funding for vocational education and training, and roads funding. Payments direct to local government are also expected to increase substantially as a result of the Local Capital Works Program to commence in 1992-93. About one quarter of the increase in total SPPs in 1992-93 are initiatives set out in the Treasurer's August 1992 Statement, Working for the Future.

Distribution of SPPs²

The distribution of SPPs between States tends, in general, to be more even in *per capita* terms than other forms of assistance. This is because population is a more significant factor in the determination of the distribution of the major specific purpose programs than, for example, general revenue assistance where horizontal fiscal equalisation is applied (see Chapter III). As discussed below, however, the Grants Commission seeks

to take account of the interstate distribution of selected SPPs in recommending *per capita* general revenue grant relativities. (Table 22 shows the variation for each State and Territory from the average *per capita* level of Commonwealth net payments in 1991-92.)

Table 23 shows the variation from the average *per capita* level of SPPs for a number of major programs. Capital SPPs are less evenly distributed on a *per capita* basis than current SPPs.

There are a range of important considerations bearing on the distribution of some of the major programs among the States in 1991-92 and 1992-93.

 Current grants for higher education are determined on the basis of negotiations with individual institutions and take into account their historical base, educational profile, levels of enrolment and relative rates of participation as well as student demand for places in the different States and regions.

- Current grants for schools reflect eligible student numbers, the types of institution (government and non-government) and the level of education (primary and secondary) provided. Current funding for TAFE has been distributed taking into account relative State and Territory shares of teaching effort and achievements under resource agreements which reflect Commonwealth objectives although, as noted below, the July 1992 agreement to establish the Australian National Training Authority will have implications for the distribution of growth funding from 1993.
- Capital grants for higher education are distributed primarily on the basis of factors such as enrolments and relative needs. Capital grants for TAFE colleges are distributed on the basis of teaching effort, relative needs between States (covering participation rates and standard of existing facilities) and, for the smaller States, the size of an individual building project. Capital grants for schools are allocated primarily in proportion to enrolments.
- Hospital funding grants, which were introduced in 1988-89 and comprise the bulk
 of health grants, are distributed on a per capita basis weighted according to age
 and sex.
- General purpose assistance for local government, which is classified as an SPP through the States because State Governments are required to pass on the funds to local authorities, moved to an equal per capita distribution in 1989-90 (as discussed in Chapter III).
- Grants for public housing are distributed largely on an equal per capita basis with around three quarters of 1991-92 assistance being either funded on this basis or phased to this basis, over a three year period. The amounts transferred from general purpose capital funding to the CSHA in 1989-90 reflected the historical distribution of that program. The distribution of these amounts has since been phased to an equal per capita basis to apply from 1992-93. The remainder of the program is distributed on the basis of other criteria such as housing needs of Aboriginals and pensioners.
- The distribution of roads grants reflects factors such as the length, class and usage of roads in each State and Territory. The recently agreed rationalisation of Commonwealth/State responsibilities for roads, to take effect from 1993-94 (including the agreement to untie \$350m in roads funding) noted below will also result in changes in the interstate allocation of the \$350m which will move progressively to a financial assistance grants basis by 1997-98.

Fiscal Equalisation and Specific Purpose Payments

In determining *per capita* relativities for the distribution of general revenue assistance, the Grants Commission takes account of the interstate distribution of selected current SPPs consistent with the principle of fiscal equalisation³. There are two main methods of dealing with current SPPs for activities for which the Commission assesses relative State needs.

- Such SPPs are generally treated by inclusion that is, expenditures funded by the SPP are taken into account in its assessments while the SPP itself is assumed to be available to finance the State's overall expenditure needs.
- However, in a small number of cases, such SPPs and the State expenditures they
 fund may be treated by deduction for the purposes of the Commission's
 assessments, which would then only take account of State expenditures on that
 activity funded from State own source revenue.

In general, while the effect of the **inclusion** method on the overall distribution of funding depends on a number of factors, a State receiving a higher (lower) share of an 'included' SPP than the Grants Commission considers appropriate to satisfy its relative 'needs' in the area, will be assessed as requiring a commensurately lower (higher) share of general revenue assistance.

The Commission's treatment of Hospital Funding Grants (HFGs) is the only notable exception to these two broad approaches. While the penalties provisions and AIDS funding components are treated by deduction, the base HFGs are treated by the absorption method — that is, they are added to the pool of general revenue assistance and the Commission's recommended *per capita* relativities are determined with regard to the combined pool. The distribution of SPPs treated by inclusion or absorption (about two-thirds of current SPPs) affects the distribution of financial assistance grants.

Concerns have been expressed that this results in the Commonwealth's policy objectives being overridden and, in a number of cases, the Commonwealth has instructed the Commission to deduct certain SPPs from its assessments. A number of considerations are relevant.

- The fact that the distribution of the SPP is overridden in a financial sense need not mean that the Commonwealth's policy objectives are overridden.
- The Commission's assessments (which are based on a five year rolling review period) operate with a significant lag, and may only partially offset the distribution of individual SPPs over time.

These issues are among those likely to be canvassed by the Heads of Treasury review of fiscal equalisation (referred to in Chapter III), which will need inter alia to consider the

appropriate balance between equalisation and the achievement of national policy objectives in particular programs.

Specific Purpose Payments for Local Government Authorities

As noted above, general purpose assistance for local government is provided by the Commonwealth to the States as an SPP on the condition that it is passed on to local governments. In addition, there are two other types of Commonwealth payments to local governments:

- direct grants payments made direct to local government authorities by the Commonwealth. Such payments are relatively small and not all local government authorities are involved in each of the activities for which assistance is provided under the various Commonwealth programs (for example, the Aerodrome Local Ownership Plan); and
- assistance passed on through the States some funds provided to the States for specific purposes are passed on to local government. The amounts passed on are generally at the discretion of the State Governments, although in certain instances the amounts passed on have required approval by the Commonwealth.

The Australian Capital Territory (which has both territorial and municipal responsibilities) is eligible to receive comparable assistance in respect of its local government functions.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS IN SELECTED COMMONWEALTH PROGRAMS

The remainder of this chapter provides details of Commonwealth/State funding arrangements for key program areas which have been the subject of recent initiatives. Further details of selected funding programs were presented in the 1991-92 Budget Paper No 4, while the Catalogue of Specific Purpose Payments to the States and Territories 1991-92, produced by the Commonwealth-State Relations Secretariat in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, provides details of all SPPs.

EDUCATION

Vocational Education and Training

The Commonwealth provides current and capital assistance to the States and Territories to support the operations of their TAFE systems under the States Grants (TAFE Assistance) Act 1989.

In 1992-93 total payments under the legislation are estimated to be \$516.7m, an increase of 25.9 per cent over 1991-92, including the growth component of \$70m in the

1993 calendar year announced in *One Nation*. In addition, funds for adult literacy are provided through annual appropriations (\$16.8m in 1992-93).

In July 1992, the Prime Minister announced the formation of the Australian National Training Authority (ANTA). This body is the result of extensive negotiations with the States and Territories. ANTA is intended to promote a national vocational education and training system. It will be responsible to a Ministerial Council chaired by the Commonwealth and with representation from all States and Territories. State training agencies will have responsibility for vocational education and training within their own borders consistent with the agreed national strategic plan on training policy, and in accordance with State Training Profiles developed in conjunction with ANTA and agreed by the Ministerial Council.

Except where a State relinquishes financial responsibility, States will pass to ANTA an amount equal to their own source State funding for vocational education and training. An equal amount will be returned to respective States and Territories. States have agreed to at least maintain their 1992 effort in real terms pending the development of an agreement on outcome measures of effort.

The Commonwealth will maintain its current level of financial support for vocational education and training under States grants arrangements (including the \$100m in TAFE current funding provided in the *Economic Statement* of November 1991, which will be distributed under existing arrangements).

The Commonwealth will provide growth funding, including the \$70m nationally in each year of the 1993-95 triennium as announced in *One Nation*. All growth funding for 1993 will be allocated on a proportional basis in accordance with relevant population shares. For 1994 and 1995, 80 per cent of cumulative growth funds (ie, \$112m in 1994, and \$168m in 1995) will be allocated on the same basis, with the balance to be allocated by the Ministerial Council on the recommendation of ANTA, having regard to assessed performance against agreed objectives and other relevant factors.

Commonwealth funds will be provided to ANTA for passing to State training agencies or to other parties as appropriate in the case of agreed national projects.

The new arrangements come into force on 1 January 1994. Transitional arrangements, including provision for an interim Board of ANTA, will apply for 1993.

HOSPITAL FUNDING GRANTS

Hospital funding grants are the main form of Commonwealth assistance to the States and the Territories for health purposes. From 1988-89, they replaced identified health grants (which had been a component of general revenue assistance) and Medicare compensation grants. The grants for the States are estimated to total \$3922m in

1992-93, 3.6 per cent higher than in 1991-92. Hospital funding grants are indexed for general cost increases (award wages and CPI) plus an age-sex weighted population factor. This indexation factor is expected to provide significant real growth in hospital funding. (Statement 3 in Budget Paper No 1 provides further information on the prospective growth in these grants.)

The hospital funding grant for 1992-93 consists of a base level of funding for each State (a total of \$3834m) and an incentives package (\$47.8m). (The 1992-93 Budget allocation does not include an estimate for the public provision adjustment involving penalties.) The totals of the base funding and the incentives package have been indexed as described above from 1991-92. In addition, \$39.6m is being provided to the States for the treatment of AIDS cases (this is indexed by the increase in the number of AIDS patients over the year to 1 November as well as the general indexation arrangements described above).

The present estimates of the interstate distribution of hospital grants in 1992-93 are in Table 24. These are based on recent projections of the distribution of population as at December 1992 weighted by age and sex; the final distribution of base grants in 1992-93 will be based on the population as at December 1992 to be estimated by the ABS in May 1993.

The Australian Capital Territory will receive a payment analogous to the hospital funding grants paid to the States of \$52.9m (including a base payment of \$52.2m) in 1992-93.

The Commonwealth is also to provide a range of financial assistance measures to each State and Territory (detailed below), on the basis that each will agree to enter into a new five year Hospital Funding Agreement from 1993-94. (Budget Related Paper No 8 and Statement 3 in Budget Paper No 1 provide a detailed description of Health policy initiatives for 1992-93 and beyond).

Funds will be made available from 1992-93 for a number of new incentive programs in the health area. The intention is that these will be incorporated in the new hospital funding grants from 1993-94. The major focus of these programs will be:

- improving public patient access to hospitals by reducing waiting lists, including through the treatment of public patients in private hospitals where suitable arrangements are reached between the public and private hospital (\$50m in 1992-93);
- accelerating the integration of mental health services into the acute hospital and community care systems (\$6m in 1992-93 of which \$3.7m will be provided to the States);

- capital outlays on the upgrading and further development of the public hospital system (\$3m in 1992-93);
- the further development of area health management within the States' health systems and the extension of cost-based casemix information systems to facilitate hospital resource management (\$1.5m in 1992-93 of which \$0.1m will be provided to the States); and
- the development of a health communications network and a joint Commonwealth State management agency, together with initiatives to develop clinical budgeting and management within hospitals (\$3.5m in 1992-93 of which \$0.1m will be provided to the States).

Additional funds are also to be made available from 1992-93 for several measures to improve the quality of aged care services. (Details are in Budget Statement 3.)

Further, the Commonwealth has set aside funds from 1993-94 for a substantial bonus pool (\$208.5m in 1993-94) to encourage improved access for public patients to the hospital system. The amount of the bonus available for each State or Territory in any year will be based on its relative level of public provision. The funds for the bonus pool will be committed for each State and Territory once it agrees to a new five year Hospital Funding Agreement.

As discussed earlier in this chapter, the distribution of the base level of hospital funding grants is taken into account in calculating the distribution of financial assistance grants to the States. The incentives package and the public provision adjustment of the hospital funding grants, together with the AIDS component since 1989-90, have been quarantined in determining the distribution of financial assistance grants among the States so that each State's share of these payments or penalties is determined on the basis of factors such as the State by State incidence of AIDS cases or the extent of States' compliance with certain Commonwealth health objectives. If these components were not to be quarantined then, for example, larger payments (or penalties) in these categories could be offset by smaller (or larger) financial assistance grants. Consistent with this, the new incentive programs to be introduced in the health area from 1992-93 will also be quarantined from Grants Commission processes.

The new bonus arrangements to apply from 1993-94 have been designed to provide a more direct and better targetted incentive for public patient access than the current arrangements whereby the Grants Commission makes some allowance for differences in the mix of public and private bed days in its recommendations of *per capita* relativities for the distribution of financial assistance grants. It is anticipated that the Commission will take full account of this initiative in the current review of its methodology to apply from 1993-94, although the Commonwealth is prepared, if necessary, in the context of the Commission's review, to instruct the Commission accordingly to ensure that the intent of Commonwealth policy is not diluted.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAMS

The major forms of Commonwealth assistance to the States and Territories for the provision of community services are the Home and Community Care Program (HACC), the Supported Accommodation Assistance Program (SAAP), Aged Care Assessment services and the provision of some child care assistance. The Commonwealth provides the larger part of its funding for community services — for example, nursing homes and hostels and child care — directly to service providers rather than through the States.

The HACC program provides support services to enable frail aged and younger disabled persons at risk of institutionalisation to remain at home. In 1992-93, \$351.6m is to be provided to the States and Territories.

SAAP provides crisis accommodation and transitional support for homeless people. In 1992-93, \$95.6m will be provided to the States and Territories. Under the 1989 five year agreements between the Commonwealth and the States, the Commonwealth provides SAAP funds on a cost shared basis. In each of 1992-93 and 1993-94, the Commonwealth funding will include a growth element of \$3.5m.

In addition to SAAP funding, \$5.4m will be provided on a matched basis to the States in 1992-93 for innovative services development focused on priorities for homeless youth.

As part of the Commonwealth's offer in regard to the new Hospital Funding Agreement to operate from 1993-94:

- higher levels of nursing home benefit are to be provided to residents in State Government nursing homes;
- funding is to be provided for a pilot project involving six Aged Care Assessment
 Teams as budget holders purchasing services for the aged to facilitate their return
 to community care from hospital care; and
- funding will be provided to facilitate the co-ordination of aged residential, hospital, pharmaceutical and medical services in rural and remote locations.

The cost of these new arrangements is expected to be \$5.9m in 1992-93 rising to \$71.9m in 1995-96 of which \$0.4m in 1992-93 and \$2.2m in 1995-96 are SPPs (although the increase in Commonwealth own purpose outlays represents expenditure savings for the States).

DISABILITY SERVICES PROGRAM

The July 1991 special Premiers' Conference agreed to a significant rationalisation of responsibilities in the area of disability services. It was agreed that States and Territories would assume responsibility for administering accommodation services and that the Commonwealth would assume responsibility for administering employment related services for people with disabilities. Consequently, on 30 July 1991 the Commonwealth and State Governments signed the Commonwealth-State Disability Agreement (CSDA), with details of this agreement to be negotiated on a bilateral basis subsequently.

Bilateral transfer schedules have been concluded with Victoria, Queensland, Tasmania and the Australian Capital Territory to make the CSDA effective from 1 July 1992 in those States and the Australian Capital Territory. As expenditure on accommodation services generally exceeds that on employment services, there will be a net transfer of funds from the Commonwealth to the States.

Arrangements are yet to be concluded with the remaining States and the Northern Territory.

HOUSING

In 1992-93, the Commonwealth will provide a total of \$1053.3m to the States and Territories for housing.

Funding earmarked for the Mortgage and Rent Assistance Program and the Crisis Accommodation Program component of the CSHA is classified to the 'Social Security and Welfare Function'. Portions of the assistance available under the CSHA are also earmarked for pensioner housing and Aboriginal housing. The States are required to

match assistance provided under the Mortgage and Rent Assistance Program and Untied Rental Assistance on a dollar for dollar basis.

During 1992-93, the Commonwealth, States and Territories will be conferring on a package of reforms to the CSHA with a view to improving the accountability and responsiveness of State Housing Authorities and to improving the targeting of the stock of public housing.

Other modifications to the CSHA are:

- a reduction of \$50m in tied CSHA grants in 1992-93 to those States that are unable
 to expend the full amount over the year, in order to deter unnecessary carryover of
 funds between years and to encourage target achievement; and
- the bringing foward of untied CSHA funding of \$75m in 1992-93 and \$25m in 1993-94 (with reductions of \$50m in each of 1994-95 and 1995-96). (Details are in Budget Paper No 1 Statement 3 and the Working for the Future Statement.)

Other developments in the housing area include:

- a new Community Housing Program is to be created, with additional funding of \$23.7m to be provided in 1992-93, rising to \$39.6m in 1995-96; and
- the Private Rental Housing Subsidy program is to be abolished and a new program, the Social Housing Subsidy Program, will from 1992-93 assist State Governments to borrow funds to cover the cost of the public equity portion of shared home ownership arrangements for some low and moderate income households. The Commonwealth contribution will be a maximum of \$8m in 1993-94, rising to \$24m in 1995-96.

Part of the funding under the Community Housing Program and the Social Housing Subsidy Program may be SPPs.

Table 25 shows the distribution of payments under the CSHA in 1992-93.

ROADS

The Australian Land Transport Development (ALTD) Program provides grants to the States and Territories for road construction and maintenance (including engineering and other improvements at locations with a poor safety record). The program also provides funds for urban public transport projects as well as to approved organisations for land transport research and road safety programs.

Under One Nation, the Commonwealth will provide significant additional road grants of \$429.5m in 1992-93 and \$140m in 1993-94, under the various categories of roads in the ALTD Program. In addition, the Commonwealth and States have recently agreed on a significant rationalisation of road funding responsibilities post 1993 which will result, inter alia, in a transfer of \$350m of funding from SPPs to identified roads grants within general revenue assistance to the States and Territories. (Details are provided in Chapter III and Budget Paper No 1 Statement 3).

Additional funding of \$60m is also being provided in 1992-93 for the Blackspot Program. (Further details are contained in the Treasurer's August 1992 Statement Working for the Future.)

Table 26 shows the distribution of funding from 1990-91 to 1992-93 by category of road. Additional funds under *One Nation* are spread over a number of programs within the table.

A number of decisions on the distribution between States and Territories have still to be taken. The distributions presented below are therefore provisional.

LOCAL CAPITAL WORKS PROGRAM

As part of its employment strategy, the Commonwealth is to provide about \$245m in 1992-93 and around \$100m in 1993-94 on a new Local Capital Works Program to be undertaken in partnership with local government.

This program will focus on those regions and local governments which have experienced and are experiencing higher than average rates of unemployment. The funds will be available to local councils for capital works projects which will provide economic and social benefits for local communities.

Further details of the program are set out in the Treasurer's August 1992 Statement Working for the Future.

NATURAL DISASTERS

Commonwealth payments under Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements assist the States and Territories to meet the costs of providing relief and restoration following natural disasters. The arrangements recognise the States' primary responsibility under the Constitution for the administration, provision and financing of relief measures. (Details of these arrangements are provided in Budget Statement 3.)

Estimated payments in 1992-93 of \$60m reflect States' advice on likely further expenditure on recent disasters, an allowance for the cost of any disasters which may occur in 1992-93, and further anticipated claims from New South Wales in respect of disaster expenditure since 1987.

Table 27 records, for recent years, payments to each State allocated to particular types of disasters.

NOTES

- Individual specific purpose programs are described more fully in Statement 3 of Budget Paper No 1, and in the Catalogue of Specific Purpose Payments to the States and Territories 1991-92 produced by the Commonwealth-State Relations Secretariat in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.
- As in other years, the distribution of assistance for 1992-93 under some programs is dependent upon the recipient governments undertaking to participate in programs or approve particular projects. For a few programs, final decisions on the distribution of payments among the States and the Territories have still to be taken by the Commonwealth; for others, the final distribution for 1992-93 will not be settled until further data become available. In such cases, a provisional or notional estimate of the likely distribution is included. This does not commit the Commonwealth to a particular level of funding or indicate that a State or Territory has agreed to participate in the program.

The general purpose funds identified in this appendix are classified under the 'Not Allocated to Function' heading in Budget Paper No 1, except for amounts nominated for public housing from the State Governments' Loan Council programs, and analogous general purpose capital assistance to the Northern Territory and Australian Capital Territory paid up to 1988-89. These amounts, classified in this appendix as general purpose capital funds, were included in Budget Paper No 1 under the 'Housing and Community Amenities' functional heading. Specific purpose payments are further divided into those paid to the States and Territories (by far the larger group by number) and those judged to be paid through the States to other groups. Programs in the latter group are indicated within the table by (*) and separate totals are provided in the summary to each table.

APPENDIX II: TABLES OF PAYMENTS TO THE STATES AND TERRITORIES 1988-89 TO 1992-93 (ESTIMATES)

This appendix provides details of each State's and Territory's share of the items included in Appendix 1 for each year from 1988-89 to 1992-93.

Detailed discussion of general revenue assistance, general purpose capital assistance and specific purpose payments can be found in Chapters III, IV and V respectively.

As in other years, the distribution of assistance for 1992-93 under some programs is dependent upon the recipient government undertaking to participate in programs or approve particular projects. For a few programs, final decisions on the distribution of payments among the States and Territories have still to be taken by the Commonwealth; for others, the final distribution for 1992-93 will not be settled until further data becomes available. In such cases, a provisional or notional estimate of the likely distribution is included. This does not commit the Commonwealth to a particular level of funding or indicate that a State or Territory has agreed to participate in the program.

APPENDIX III: TABLES OF PAYMENT TO OR FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES, 1989-89 TO 1992-93 (ESTIMATES)

This appendix provides details of Commonwealth payments to or for local government authorities in each of the States and the Northern Territory. The payments are in three categories:

- general purpose assistance which is initially paid to the States and the Northern Territory which are required to pass on the entire amount as untied assistance to local government authorities;
- direct grants paid under a number of speicfic purpose programs for which local government authorities are eligible and have recived assistance; and
- assistance passed on through the States and the Northern Territory which is generally passed on at the discretion of the State and Northern Territory governments, although in some instances Commonwealth aproval is required. Elsewhere in this Paper, such assistance is classified as a specific purpose payment to the six States and the Northern Territory. The amounts shown are those supplied by State Treasuries for the period 1988-89 to 1991-921. In some years, for certain programs, lags can result in amounts passed on by a State to local government exceeding Commonwealth payments to that State. There are no estimates for 1992-93.
